

## Council meeting 11<sup>th</sup> February

There will be a meeting of the full Council on 11<sup>th</sup> February. The only topic for discussion/debate is the budget for the County Council over the next year. There may be an amendment put to the meeting by one or more if the opposition parties but such amendments have to be presented and agreed by the Monitoring Officer by next Monday so there will probably be press coverage of any alternative budgets. It could be an interesting debate as the previous Conservative majority of 2 is reduced to 0. That assumes that everyone turns up...

The budget itself has received coverage through the release of papers to the Scrutiny committee in October last year, and the Cabinet meeting in January of this year.

## Cabinet 23<sup>rd</sup> February

There are three items published on the Forward Plan that are due to appear on the Cabinet papers. The first is the Quarterly Budget monitoring report – showing the councils current position against the approved budget. The second item is the school admission arrangements for the school year 2017/18. The third item is the agreement to bring 200 Syrian refugees under the Government Syrian Resettlement Programme (SRP). A requirement of the SRP is for the council to provide casework support to the refugees. Syrian refugees are due to come to Suffolk in Spring 2016 and because of the short timescale it is proposed to contract Suffolk Refugee Support for the first year and to start a tender process to select a casework support provider for years two to five.

## Council meeting 17<sup>th</sup> March

There will be a meeting of the full Council on 17<sup>th</sup> March. There is currently one motion to be debated by the Council members – it is related to the new community transport structure. This was announced on February 9<sup>th</sup> and the new service in Mid Suffolk will be delivered by Aspire Together from June 16<sup>th</sup> this year. Some residents will find that there is no change to their current provider.In future there will simply be one telephone number for residents to use to get the service they need. I understand that there may be other motions to be debated, possibly on the Fire and Rescue Service, but I have not seen the detail yet.

## Cabinet 22<sup>nd</sup> March

There are a number of items published on the Forward Plan that are due to appear in the Cabinet papers for the 22<sup>nd</sup> March. The ones that may be of interest to us are the Review of the Flood Risk Management, a joint Norfolk and Suffolk Trading Standards service and the details of the new Emergency Services Mobile Communications Programme.

The Review of Flood Risk Management will look at the areas of local flooding. We don't have many in this area but if there are areas that local residents are concerned about they should look at this Cabinet paper and make sure that they have their input. Areas that I will point out to the officers are Norton to Tostock road by the bridge and the road between Norton and Great Ashfield. Some of this flooding may be because of poor ditch maintenance – but it all needs to be logged.

The prospect of a Joint Norfolk and Suffolk Trading Standards Service is being considered. The benefits of a joint team are believed to outweigh the risks. It is hoped that this proposal will provide a more resilient service. The Suffolk team are of course responsible for monitoring traffic through Felixstowe, amongst other things, and they do an extremely valuable job in keeping us as consumers safe.

The Emergency Services Mobile Communications Programme (ESMCP) will replace the current 'Airwaves' service. This is used by our fire eng pi. The first is the Quarterly Budget monitoring report – showing the councils current position against the approved budget. The second item is the schines, officers and combined fire control. The programme is led nationally by the Home Office and is being developed across all three emergency services and other public safety users

Finance and Budget for next year

The medium term financial strategy and the budget were both agreed at Full Council on 25<sup>th</sup> February. Council tax is to increase by 6p per week for a Band D property. This equates to approximately 1.9% increase. The mandatory 1% reduction in Council House rents has had a major effect on the Housing Revenue Account and the housing team are still working on longer term plans to offset the loss in revenue. However a balanced budget for 2016/17 has been agreed. The treasury management strategy and pay policy were also agreed by the council.

## Green group proposals for the budget

We (the opposition) raised concerns about the amount of money accumulating in the 'transformation fund'. There is currently about £6.5M in this reserve and it is set to rise to nearly £9M during the next financial year. So far only a few hundred thousand pounds have been earmarked for spending on specific projects.

## Devolution updates

I attended the LGIU briefing about devolution in Bury on 17<sup>th</sup> February. The Government are now calling for us to join an 'Eastern Powerhouse' consisting of Norfolk, Suffolk, Cambridgeshire and Peterborough. A first draft of the bid has now been drawn up but it is still very much a work in progress. It seems to be a very fluid process but one which has a tight deadline.

#### **New Joint Local Plan**

Initial discussions with members are now underway regarding the suggested growth across both districts. There will be a need for a larger number of homes to be built across Mid Suffolk with the prospect for devolution. Potential sites for housing are being identified and the proposals will shortly be out for public consultation.

## Management review

Following the recent internal management review there have been a number of changes to the tier 4 appointments.

## Passivhaus design

Following a resolution last year, a report about the possibility of building new council homes to Passivhaus specification is to be discussed by the Executive Committee on Monday 7<sup>th</sup> March.

## **Doorstep Roofing Companies**

The department has been made aware of a roofing company that has been going door to door offering services such as 'Plastic Dry Verge Caps' and 'Re-pointing Ridge Tiles'.

We would be very interested to hear from anyone who may have been approached by such a company. Should they return to Suffolk and visit your home, please don't confront them. Instead contact us on 03454 040506 and report the incident ASAP, giving as much detail as possible, including the date, time, address, descriptions and any vehicle details.

## **Telephone Scam Purporting to be from GP Surgery**

<u>Police forces have become aware of a fraud circulating that is targeting elderly and vulnerable members</u> of the community.

It has been reported that some people have received telephone calls from a caller who purports to be from the GP Surgery and is asking for an appointment to discuss their personal mobility needs. During the appointment, the person is persuaded to buy mobility aids which are either unnecessary or inappropriate and always expensive.

If you receive such a call, please do not give any personal details and hang up. It is advisable to wait 20 minutes, then check your phone has a dial tone, and contact your GP Surgery directly to see if this was a genuine call.

## **Suspended Jail Sentence for eBay Fraudster**

A Haverhill resident has received a 5 month suspended jail sentence and ordered to pay £4,800 costs after pleading guilty to giving the impression goods could be sold, when they were in fact deemed to be unsafe, and to two counts of failing to carry out a product recall on unsafe products.

Mr Yacuba Ibrahim was sentenced to 6 months per offence, reduced to 5 months, to run concurrently, suspended for 12 months. He was also ordered to forfeit all remaining products, meaning the generators will now be destroyed.

## **DVSA Fixed Penalty Email Scam Warning**

The Driver and Vehicle Standards Agency has been made aware that members of the public have received <u>emails claiming to be from the DVSA Fixed Penalty Office</u> with an attachment to a 'fixed penalty receipt'.

Do not open the attachment, or click on any links within the email, and do not reply to it. The DVSA never sends fixed penalty notices to customers via email.

## **Fake Amazon Survey Email**

The email offers 'valued customers' £10 for completing a quick survey.

Anyone following the link in the message will be taken to website designed to look similar in style to genuine Amazon pages which requests account log in details. Following this the next page then requests a variety of other personal information including address, phone number, credit card details, sort code, bank account number and 'security question' too.

Always be wary of unexpected emails claiming to be from well-known brands offering free items, vouchers or credit for completing an online survey. If you receive this or a similar email treat it with caution and delete it if you are suspicious in any way.

## 'SMishing'

'SMiShing' is a technique used by criminals to try to steal information about a person's identity by sending them a text with a link to a website.

Just like with email, attackers can use text message spam to spread malware, phishing scams and other threats among mobile device users.

Usually the text will look like it's from a genuine business – a bank, for example asking you to take immediate action to click on a link. The content of the message can say you've won a competition, or you need to update your account details. These details can then be used by fraudsters to steal your identity, duplicate credit cards and make money transfers. One text cost a man £23,000.

If you have the slightest doubt about the authenticity of a text message, don't click any links.

#### Remain vigilant to phishing scams

According to Action Fraud, phishing scams remain the very real threat to consumers, stating that they receive, on average, 8,000 reports a month on this type of scam alone.

Phishing is the attempt to acquire sensitive information from you by pretending to be a trustworthy entity, such as your bank, local council or even the emergency services. Phishing scams can be by email, telephone or text message.

If you receive an email or a telephone call from someone you don't recognise, do not respond, do not give out any personal information and report the communication to Action Fraud.

## Buying on the Internet? Do so with caution

Suffolk Trading Standards continue receive a steady stream of complaints and information from members of the public about on line sellers that may not be all that they seem.

The website that you are looking at may appear to be based in the UK and it may appear to be selling genuine goods. However, the reality is often quite different. In addition, not all sellers on Facebook are as genuine as they seem, with allegations of counterfeit or illicit goods being made to us on a regular basis.

We take these complaints seriously and will act appropriately wherever possible. However, for advice and guidance on buying on-line head over to our <u>Blog</u>.

## No Cold Calling Zones in Action

Suffolk Trading Standards have established 77 No Cold Calling Zones so far across the county in an effort to empower local communities and to prevent unwanted doorstep calls from traders.

Instances where traders ignore these zones are rare but if it happens, we will respond. This past week, we received a complaint from a resident in Estuary Road, Shotley and Officers attended with colleagues from Suffolk Constabulary. A full investigation will be carried out and appropriate action taken based on the facts of the case.

## **Annual Parish Meeting**

Annual Parish Meeting in 2016 is planned for 11 May at 7.30p.m. in the Village Hall.

The formal notice and agenda will be posted on the Notice Boards and website at least seven days before date of meeting.

At the last Parish Council meeting it was decided to hold the Annual Parish Meeting and the Annual Parish Council Meeting separately. There can be confusion between the Annual Parish Meeting and the Annual Parish Council Meeting.

All Parish Councils throughout England are required by law to hold an Annual Parish Meeting, which must take place between 1st March and the 1st June (inclusive). It is considered best practice to hold the Annual Parish Meeting and the Annual Parish Council Meeting on different occasions to avoid confusion.

The Annual Parish Meeting is a meeting of all the electors for the Parish. It is NOT a Meeting of the Parish Council. Anyone may attend but only registered electors of Tostock Parish may speak and vote. An elector may make suggestions and comment on anything pertinent to the people of Tostock.

This will be welcomed and is the whole purpose of the meeting.

The Chairperson of the Parish Council normally chairs the meeting. If the Chair is not able to attend, then the Vice-chair, else the meeting will elect a chairperson from amongst those electors present.

A written record of the meeting will be taken

The Chair of the Parish Council gives a report at the meeting and in recent years the local councillors have been invited to give a report, as well as the Village Hall and other clubs and organisations of the village.

The Annual Parish Council Meeting will be held on 25<sup>th</sup> May. This will be a normal council meeting, but each year a chair and vice-chair need to be elected at the beginning of this meeting.

I bet there is not a single person in Tostock that at some time in their lives that haven't marvelled at the sheer charm and cuteness of the adorable new born lambs skipping around the fields at Spring time, I know I have. It's got to be the number one spot most iconic sights and sounds of Spring. So for this edition I thought we'd look at some different breeds of sheep and some are rare breeds, after all our countryside wouldn't be the same without them. Sheep have been in existence for thousands of years. In the early fifties before we ever had television I remember on Sunday nights listening to the Cliff Adams singers on the radio programme called 'Sing Something Simple' and come every April they would sing a song called "All in the April Evening" the lyrics go – Sheep with their little lambs passed me by on the road" well that song has stayed with me ever since. There are over a 100 breeds of sheep in this country including some that are rare breeds. My utmost favourite has to be the Herdwick. Herdwicks have grazed the high fells of the Lake District for over 1,000 years.

The origin of the breed is lost to time, but its name is derived from the Old Norse word for sheep farm, herd-vik or sheep pasture Herdwick.

Beatrix Potter's passion for Herdwick led to her becoming a farmer and successfully breeding, showing and judging the breed. Upon her death in 1943 she left many farms and flocks of Herdwick to the National Trust. Herdwicks remain on the fells for most of the year but brought down to the farms some 6 or 7 times a year for clipping, dosing, shearing, tupping (mating), scanning and lambing. The ewes will take their lambs to graze on an area of the fell known as their "heaf". This knowledge of where to graze is known as the "heafing instinct" and is passed onto each generation. The Herdwick are every bit as important to the Lake-land scene as fells and packhorse bridges. Ewes usually have just one lamb due to the harsh conditions on the fells in April/May. Lambs are born black with white tips on their ears. During the first year the fleece turns brown and the head and legs turn white, then the second year the fleece takes on its familiar grey colour which get lighter with age.

The Swaledale is a breed of domestic sheep named after the Yorkshire valley of Swaledale in England. They are found throughout the more mountainous areas of Great Britain, but particularly in the Yorkshire Dales, County Durham and around the Pennine fells of Cumbria. Swaledales are noted for their off-white wool, curled horns and white around their nose and eyes. They are used for the production of lamb/mutton, the North of England Mule sheep, and as Pedigree breeding stock. Together with the Rough Fell Herdwick and Dalesbred sheep, they are one of the three variations associated with the English Lake District.

The Wensleydale Longwood breed of sheep originated in North Yorkshire early in the 19<sup>th</sup> century from across between a long since extinct local Longwood breed from the region of the River Tees and an outstanding Dishley Leicester ram named "Bluecap" The breed was developed to produce hardy rams for crossing onto hill ewes, together with high quality and valuable lustre fleeces.

The breed is probably unique in that its Association is able to not only identify a foundation sire, but also trace that ram's parentage, year and place of birth and breeder. "Bluecap" was born in 1839 in the hamlet of East Appleton, 5 miles NNW of Bedale in North Yorkshire. His qualities which determined the breed type without any further infusion of Leicester blood, were his dark skin, superb quality of wool and size – 204 kg (448 lbs) as a shear. The breed type was not named until 1876, when a name was required for classes at the Yorkshire Show.

Now from Yorkshire we go up north to the Hebrides. The Hebridean is a breed of small black sheep from Scotland, similar to other members of the Northern European short-tailed sheep group, having a short, triangular tail. They often have two pairs of horns. They were often formerly known as "St Kilda" sheep although unlike Soay and Boreray sheep they are probably not in fact from the St Kilda archipeligo. Modern Hebrideans have black, rather coarse wool, which fades to brown in the sun and often becomes grey with age, there is no wool on the face and legs. If not shorn the wool may moult naturally in Spring. Rams and ewes typically have one pair of horns, but often have two or even more pairs (polycerate) and occasionally none. They are considerably smaller than most other breed of sheep, fully grown ewes weighing only around 40kg (88 lbs) and the rams slightly heavier at around 50 to 60kg (110 to 130 lbs).

It has been reported that the muscle tissue and fats of the Hebridean have significantly less cholesterol than other well known breeds. Hebrideans are hardy and able to thrive on rough grazing, and so are often used as conservation grazing animals to maintain natural grassland or heathland habitats. They are particularly effective at scrub control, having a strong preference for browsing.

Y GYMDEITHAS DEFAID MYNDD CYMREIG —The Welsh Mountain sheep is one of the oldest sheep breeds in the world, with references to the breed found in literature of the Middle Ages. It is still as important today for modern agriculture as any other breed. Welsh Moutain sheep are economical and hardy, they are also good grazers and make excellent mothers. Other advantages are that they are inexpensive to purchase, lamb easily and require little additional feed.

Finally we can't go without talking about our own county the Suffolks



Here at Rectory and Woodend Green Farm in Tostock we keep and breed our native breed of sheep the Suffolk. Tostock Suffolks kept by Tom Stocking has had great success showing and breeding this magnificent sheep at our regional shows and even notched several ribbons and a few champions along the way! The Suffolk evolved from the mating of Norfolk Horn ewes with Southdown rams in the Bury St Edmunds area, these sheep were known as Southdown Norfolks, or locally as "Black faces" The first recording is in 1797 when in his "General view of agriculture in the county of Suffolk" Arthur Young stated: "These ought to be called the Suffolk breed, the mutton has superior texture, flavour, quantity and colour of gravy"

Suffolk's developed around the rotational system of farming in East Anglia, grazing on grass or clover in the summer and after weaning the ewes could be put on salt marshes or stubbles. Swedes, turnips or mangles were grazed in the winter. From the earliest days sheep were exported around the world, to Austria, France, Germany, Switzerland, Russia, North and South America and the colonies. The Suffolk has developed over the years to match consumer demands, they are now found throughout the world's sheep producing countries and are still the flag-ship breed in the British Isles and recognised as the leading terminal sire on a variety of ewes to produce top quality prime lamb. Not bad for a little old sheep from Suffolk and Tostock - Well done Tom, Congratulations also to Katie for being on BBC 1 Countryfile programme about a month ago.

To wet your appetite here is a well known recipe – Lancashire Hotpot, it is a great British dish that uses cheap cuts of meat and root vegetables. It can be cooked in a slow cooker too, so you can return home to a hot meal after a long day out in the cold.

You will need: – 675g middle neck of lamb cubed, 2 tbsp seasoned flour, 2 tbsp oil, 450g potatoes peeled and sliced into rounds, 2 onions, 3 carrots peeled and sliced, salt and pepper, 300ml lamb or beef stock, butter.

Method: Preheat oven to 190c fan 170c, toss lamb in flour and fry in oil until brown, In a large casserole dish place alternate layers of vegetables and lamb, seasoning as you go, and finish with a layer of potatoes, pour over stock, dot top with butter, cover and bake for 90 mins, remove from oven and take off lid, brush potatoes with melted butter, then return to oven uncovered and brown for 30

mins. Bon Appetit - ENJOY


