## Thedwastre North – June 2017

Report by County Councillor—Jane Storey

## Council Meeting 25th May

Following on from the County Council elections on 4<sup>th</sup> May the Annual Meeting of Suffolk County Council took place on 25<sup>th</sup> May. Typically such meetings are a confirmation of appointments and calendars for the next 12-18 months. This year was no exception.

The results of the election were such that the Conservatives have 52 councillors, Labour have 11 and an alliance of Green, Lib Dems and Independents have formed another 'group' of 12. The Leader of that group, David Wood, has declined to be 'Leader of the Opposition', leaving the title of the official opposition to the Labour group.

The Leader of the Council is once again Colin Noble and he has chosen me to be his Deputy. I am also the Cabinet member with responsibility for Broadband and Rural issues. The other members of the Cabinet have stayed much as they were before – with two changes – Paul West replaces Christopher Hudson as Cabinet member for Ipswich, and Robin Millar becomes the Cabinet member for Families and Communities.

In addition to the usual papers for the meeting there was a paper regarding a change of the way some committees are organised. The Constitution Working Party have looked at different ways for all councillors to be involved with the decision making process. Under the current 'Cabinet' model the Cabinet decide most things without needing to involve other councillors. The Constitution Working Party has been looking at a 'hybrid' system between the existing Cabinet model and going back to a committee system. They have agreement now to come back to the July council meeting with their proposals.

## **Cabinet Meeting 13th June**

There are four items on the forward plan for the Cabinet meeting on 13<sup>th</sup> June. The first item is to consider the nomination for the sponsor for the new primary school in Red Lodge. The second item is the outturn for the budget as at the end of the financial year 2016-17. There will be explanations of over and under spending and a final position for reserves and virements. The third paper is the Compulsary Purchase Order for Aldham Mill Hill – and its subsequent transfer to Persimmon Homes. The fourth paper is regarding the policy regarding staff volunteering and what they can expect in support if they do.

## **Locality Budget**

The Councillor Locality Budget has been an invaluable way to provide small sums to local organisations, and this will continue but with a reduced amount. Last year councilors had a budget of £10,000 per year but this year that figure has been reduced. I have already had a few applications but will look at any applications as they come in and then process them in the usual way.

Highways budgets are not as straightforward but I hope that I can help out with some schemes to reduces speeding through our villages.

## Thedwastre North - July 2017

Report by County Councillor—Jane Storey

#### **Chief Executive**

Suffolk County Council's Chief Executive, Deborah Cadman OBE is to take up a new role as the first permanent Chief Executive of the West Midlands Combined Authority (WMCA).

She joined Suffolk County Council in 2011 and since then has overseen a dramatic improvement in education attainment levels in Suffolk, improved staff morale and led the careful implementation of over £200million of savings made necessary by reductions in funding from government.

The recruitment process for her successor has started and at the Council meeting at the end of July we expect to announce Sue Cook as Interim and at the Council meeting in September we, as a Council, have to formally agree to her successor.

## **Cabinet Meeting 11th July**

There are three items on the agenda for the Cabinet meeting on 11<sup>th</sup> July. The first item is to consider a loan to the University of Suffolk of up to £5m to support the growth of the University. The second item is entitled Social Value and Sustainable Procurement, The Public Services (Social Value) Act 2012 obliges the Council to have regard to economic, social and environmental well-being in connection with public services contracts. This paper sets out a specific policy so that the Council can ensure that any procurement meets the requirements of the Act.

The third item on the agenda is a report on our priorities 2017-2021. We have a new council administration that was elected based on the Suffolk Conservative manifesto – not to be confused with the national Conservative manifesto. This has been taken and expanded on and the result is a document that will form the basis for our decision making, financial planning and outward consultation over the next four years. the nomination for the sponsor for the new primary school in Red Lodge. The second item is the outturn for the budget as at the end of the financial year 2016-17.

### **Highways Transformation**

A new Highways Senior Leadership Team was established with effect from 6 March 2017, with appointments made to all Head of Service roles. Heads of Service have assisted in the finalisation of the new organisational structure for Suffolk Highways, the preparation of 47 new job and person profiles (JPPs) and the conversion of 43 existing JPPs into the new Suffolk Highways JPP format. The selection process (including interviews) has taken place and appointments made during week commencing 3 July 2017.

Whilst a significant proportion of the changes to Rougham, Halesworth, Lowestoft and Brome Depots are due to be completed by the end of July 2017, accommodation works at Phoenix House will continue into August 2017.

The highway maintenance operational gangs have received follow-up 'toolbox talks' to reinforce the message that they should treat any additional potholes found when attending any site to undertake a pre-arranged repair.

During the 2016/17 winter season, although it may have appeared mild, we undertook a total of 80 Priority 1 (P1) route and 26 Priority 2 (P2) route gritting runs (compared with the 10-year average of 78 P1 route and 22 P2 route gritting runs).

## 2017 Tour of Britain

Stage 6 of the 2017 Tour of Britain will take place in Suffolk on Friday 8 September. The stage is 183km long and will start in Newmarket and finish in Aldeburgh. The last time the Tour was here (2015) it generated an economic impact for Suffolk of £2.2million, even though only half the stage was in the county – the whole stage, which was shared with Norfolk, generated £4.5million. The event also provides the opportunity to engage communities along the route to use the event to showcase their locality to a national and international audience, bring communities together and inspire people to be more active.

## Council meeting 20th July

The papers for this meeting have not been published yet but will include a report from the Independent Review Panel on councilor allowances. This panel has included business people and has come up with some interesting findings. Most allowances will either stay the same or be lost completely.

There will also be an item on Constitution changes including the introduction of Cabinet Committees. This will be a new way for councilors who are not in the Cabinet itself to preview Cabinet decisions and make recommendations on them. They can draw on outside witnesses. The Education Scrutiny committee will be included in the main Scrutiny committee and Rights of Way will be incorporated into Development Control.

## **District Councillor Locality Budget Awards 2017**

Report from District Councillor—Sarah Mansel

Following the success of the locality awards in 2015/16, MSDC have allocated each ward councillor a fund of £6250 to be spent within their communities. Any Not-for-profit constituted group with its own bank account requiring two unrelated signatories is eligible to apply for funding. This includes parish councils, sports groups, clubs, youth groups etc. Although funding is not available for religious activities, funds are available for improvements for community use of premises such as churches etc.

The funded projects need to fall into one of the strategic priorities of MSDC – which are as follows:

## **Economy and Environment**

Lead and shape the local economy by promoting and helping to deliver sustainable economic growth which is balanced with respect for wildlife, heritage and the natural and built environment.

## Housing

Ensure that there are enough good quality, environmentally efficient and cost effective homes with the appropriate tenures and in the right locations.

## Safe, Strong and Healthy Communities

Encourage and support individuals and communities to be self-sufficient, strong, healthy and safe.

Previously your district councillors gave funding towards the following projects in the Elmswell and Norton Ward:

Elmswell Library Friends – coffee machine and cycle racks

Norton Village Hall – cycle racks

Tostock Village Hall – marquee and outdoor table tennis table

Elmswell Millennium History Group – research project on the use of Ashfield Airfield during the First World War

St John's Church, Elmswell – improvements to heating and roof alarm

Elmswell Almshouses – improvements to windows

Norton Parish Council – VAS signs

Elmswell Parish Council – set up emergency plan


## **HARVEST FESTIVAL**

The up-lights show the carvings and construction of the roof, which is thought to be one of the widest in Suffolk. The heating system and the lighting were paid for from a donation generously left to St. Andrew's Church many years ago by the late Anne Morgan-Grenville, who was brought up at Tostock Place. At the time, the PCC decided to invest the money until there was a specific project which needed to be done. In 2015 it was decided to replace the heating ,which was installed in 1964, and in 2016 we felt that the Lighting was also no longer fit for purpose.

Our annual Art exhibition has been happening for nearly 40 years now and those of us who have been helping in various ways have endured many kinds of weather, from rain ,gales , bitter cold , until this year , When June really excelled itself! ## **HILDA SMITH** 100th YEAR GET TOGETHER



Arwen, had been self teaching herself gymnastics for around 6 months, then one sunny afternoon last year after the village fete, there was a knock at our front door, a very nice lady was standing there with our daughter "hello my name is Gloria Jones and I am a coach at Bury Spectrum gymnastics club, I've been watching your daughter on the green this afternoon and wondered if you have considered taking her to a gymnastics club, only she is very good!"

Well this now got me thinking After asking Arwen if she would like to go we then signed her up for a pay as you go teen gym night, and after just 3 months she was trialing for the advanced recreational class unfortunately she didn't quite make it but just 6 weeks later she trialed again and got her place, from there she has learnt so many new skills, In April she competed in her first competition winning a bronze medal on vault, just 1 month later she competed in the county competition again winning a bronze on uneven bars and qualifying for regional finals in this category, in regionals she came 11th out 21 and was only 1point short of 3rd place, not disheartened by this, there was yet another competition on the 9th July for advanced recreational GG levels where she competed in all 4 categories, floor, beam, vault and bars at a level 4 scoring the highest mark on floor (12.50) and the highest vault score of 11.20 and second place on beam (11.0) and 4th on bars (9.0) as she had the highest score overall in her age group she won the gold medal, and to add the icing on the cake she scored the highest amount of points throughout the entire competition totalling 43.70 beating all the other 15 competitors giving her the 1st place trophy,


#### COUNTRY LIFE – D. POOLE NUMBER 16


This edition we'll try something entirely different, a real country craft Corn Dollies that go back to the earliest times. They have played a significant part in rural folklore all over the world. Most ancient culture had myths purporting to explain the introduction of cereal crops as a gift of the gods and it was considered necessary to make offerings to the relevant divinities to ensure a plentiful harvest each year. Made from mainly stalks of wheat, oats, rye and barley. The making of figures and other objects from straw, especially from the last sheaf cut. The thought to derive from such offerings, and the art still flourishes today in many areas. If I can persuade just one person in Tostock to give it a go then I have succeeded, four people would be a bonus. It's a great opportunity for our young ladies during the school summer holidays. What you will need to help you is a great little book published by shire publications titled "Discovering Corn Dollies" by M. Lambeth price £5. Shire classics which you can find on the internet.

To get you started, now is a good time to nip out to the bottom of the garden and cut about twelve stalks of wheat once it is ripe from the field or you can buy proper kits from good art and craft shops or corn dolly specialists, the book will tell you where. The history of Corn Dollies – the celebration of the harvest is steeped in myth and legend, it was a time when sacrifices were made to the goddess of the earth and to all of mother natures growing seeds and plants. Primitive farmers believed that the harvest spirit responsible for the seed germination lived in the grain and the crop was cut, this spirit retreated into the last bit of corn left standing in the field at the end of the harvest. The last bundle of straw was then plaited into a unique talisman and was then carefully preserved throughout the winter months as a resting place for the spirit.

In the Spring the seeds from the plaited corn dolly was sown along with new seeds thus transforming this vital spirit force to ensure another plentiful and fertile harvest. The world-wide practice of making corn dollies is an ancien pagan craft and although designs may vary an understanding of the fertility of the earth underlies them all.

They are the outcome of the harvest and a way of saying thank you for the next successful and bountiful crop. The plaited straw ornament often had a place of honour at the harvest banquet table. It is said that the name arises from a corruption of 'corn idol' although 'corn dolly' is a relatively modern term, possibly coined in the early 20<sup>th</sup> century by enthusiasts who turned the traditional cruder work into a complex craft. Before this they were known as kern, kern babies or maidens. Some have modern names which describe the style of a corn dolly from a particular region, here are 2 samples -






But not every county has a corn dolly design specific for their area. Several have ceremonies connected with them which are still re-enacted, such as 'Crying the Neck' in Cornwall. Others continue an age old custom where the corn dolly is replaced each year with a new one as the harvest comes in, such as the Whalton Kern Babby.

The beginner will find the 5 straw plait the best to work with for this produces a four-sided or square plait. Start by tying 5 straws together close to the ears as in figure 1. The fifth straw is to help in moving on from one corner fold to the next, each time the straw being folded passes over 2 corners, it is then left and the 1 at the last corner is picked up and used in its place until the round is complete. Figure 1 we have used N, S, E, W, to help with this round, and the 5 drawings gives the positions of the straws as you work the round. The illustrated loop of plait shows what this looks like when working without a core. Figure 2. shows the same plait worked round a core and the dolly when finished. One thing it is well to realise from the beginning is that the spirit which forms the attractive pattern is the natural outcome of round exceeding round.




The first "silverware" trophies were awarded at the 1986 show. We had to cancel in 2006 and 2012 as poor weather meant there were few entries to the show.




