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Parish News

Parish Council Reserve Fund and Community Infrastructure Levy

The parish Council has about £15,000 in reserve funds, in addition we will acquire about £8,500 from the Community Infrastructure Levy generated by the development in Norton Road.

The Community Infrastructure Levy has certain restrictions on what we spend it on and we should spend it within 5 years.

The guidelines are as follows:-

The provision, improvement, replacement, operation or maintenance of infrastructure; or Anything else that is concerned with addressing the demands that development places on an area.

The reserve fund allows a bit more flexibility. Recently we have used reserve funds on the village gateways, £8,500, and on the tracks across The Leys and The Green, £3,000. We will be replacing the bench outside The Croft and installing three new dog bins. And investigate installing Speed Indicator Displays.

The Parish Council is seeking suggestions for using this money. The cost of a project is not important at this stage, we can always seek match funding, it is suggestions we seek.

A few things that come to mind or have been suggested so far are:

- Refurbish/Improve the Village Hall
- Refurbish the Village Hall playground
- Resurface the football pitch
- Plant a community orchard on the football pitch
- Landscape the football pitch and create a garden area
- New bench on The Leys

We are looking for relevant, but imaginative ideas. And of course continuing to supporting village groups and organisations. Ron Perks

COUNTRYLIFE - D. POOLE NUMBER 22

As a young lad growing up I was always amazed and intrigued at the way butterflies simply fluttered, glided and effortlessly manoeuvre around on the wing, along hedgerows, roadside verges, woodland rides and meadow grasses throughout our Suffolk countryside. You cannot help but marvel at their fantastic colours and patterns.

It wasn't until just 3 years ago that I became more and more interested, so I decided to become a lepidopterist by joining the Butterfly Conservation. Way back then I thought that the 31 species you would see in Suffolk were wide spread throughout the country and lived in almost any habitat and plant life, but unfortunately this is not the case, I have since learnt that certain butterflies need a certain habitat and thrive on certain plants, some are different to others. Some thrive on chalk hills, whilst others need heath land. gorse and heathers. Some moorland, others love wildflower meadows and grasses, and some woodland rides and glades.

At least a dozen species will come into our Tostock gardens even. Our largest and possibly the best u.k. butterfly the Swallowtail depends solely on milk parsley that grows in the Norfolk Broads, hence Norfolk is the only place you will see this beautiful butterfly, however it is very occasionally seen in people's gardens in Suffolk.

In all there are about 59 species of butterflies in the u.k. They are divided into 5 resident families. Because there are so many and so much you can say about butterflies I will have to split things into 3 different editions. So for this edition I will concentrate on the ones you will see in your gardens or around Tostock where all these photos were taken.

Currently right now the Butterfly Conservation are running their **big Butterfly count 20**th **July to 12**th **August** and they want us all to take part. You don 't have to be a member.

Butterflies are disappearing at an alarming rate due to loss of habitat. Their decline reveals the poor health of our environment so **please try and** take part in this nationwide survey and help Butterfly Conservation revive our countryside.

Spend 15 minutes in a sunny spot, use their chart to note how many of each species you see then submit your sightings at www.bigbutterflycount.org or download their free application for a chart to do the survey – thank you.

The 5 butterfly families -

Hesperiidae – the Skippers which include small Skippers, grizzled Skipper and chequered Skipper

Papilionidae – Swallowtail. The Swallowtail is our only member of this splendid family which includes some of the largest butterflies in the world

Pieridae – Whites and Yellows. The green veined White, little White, large White (commonly known as the cabbage White) Orange Tip (one of my favourite butterflies), Clouded Yellow, Brimstone

Lycaenidae – Hair Streaks, Coppers, Blues, Metal Marks, Black/Green/Brown/Purple and White Hair Streaks, small Copper, small Blue, common Blue, Holly, Chalkhill, Silver-studded and various other blues and the Duke of Burgundy

Nymphalidae – Vanessids, Fritillaries, and Browns, Red Admirals, Comma, small Tortoiseshell, marbled White, Speckled Wood, meadow Brown, small Heath, Wall and the small Pearl/boarded Fritillary, heath Fritillary

Here are the 12 most common butterflies you should see in your garden and around Tostock. Right now I have just received good news from a very reliable source (Barny) that the Silver Wash Fritillary and the White Hair Streak have been spotted In Tostock.



The Ringlet – This unassuming butterfly whose past fortunes have fluctuated is now quite common and widely distributed throughout Britain. The Ringlet is found mainly in damp woodland glades, and along shady hedgerows, they will also fly in dull or even drizzly weather.

The Brimstone – A welcome sight in the Spring sunshine, is a wanderer in the countryside and will come into your gardens.

The sulphur-yellow of the male makes it one of the most conspicuous butterflies often seen feeding on Primroses and Daffodils, Thistles and Teasels. They never seem to sit with their wings open.

The Small Copper - A Small Copper occurs in small self-contained colonies on flowery hillsides, heaths and woodland rides, but is a mobile species that will also colonise waste ground and roadside verges and may sometimes visit gardens.

The Orange Tip – The first male Orange Tip of the year is always a welcome site for butterfly enthusiasts and happens to be my favourite butterfly. It is a charming little insect that wanders the countryside along lanes, hedgerows, edges of woods and our gardens. The female lacks the orange wing tips.

The next 4 butterflies in my opinion are the most colourful and attractive British Butterflies, most regular visitors to our gardens feeding on Asters, Buddleia, Michaelmas daisies, and also Sedums.

The Tortoiseshell – The adults of this common resident butterfly can be found in almost any month of the year but is familiar in gardens in late autumn where it feeds from many cultivated flowers as mentioned above. this is one of the first butterflies to appear after hibernation usually on warm sunny days in March.

The Peacock – The startling beauty of a freshly emerged Peacock feasting with other insects on richly scented sprays of Buddleia is thankfully still a common sight on warm sunny days as this butterfly is a regular garden visitor which enjoys feeding from many nectar rich cultivated flowers, it is also frequent in woodland glades, meadows and down lands where it feeds avidly from flowers such as Knapweeds, Teasels and Thistles. Our Peacock is one of our most recognisable butterflies, and often the 1st to be seen in February and March

The Red Admiral – The dramatic colours of the Red Admiral make it one of the most easily recognisable and familiar butterflies. Yet this is an immigrant whose numbers depend on migration from North Africa and Southern Europe.

The Painted Lady – During the Winter months Painted Lady butterfly (Vanessa cardui) lives in North Africa where it breeds year round, from there this colourful butterfly spreads northwards throughout Europe during Summer, some directly migrate to Britain while others will go to countries in mainland Europe. Their progeny continuing the northward migration. The Painted Lady are large butterflies with wing spans of around 53mm (2") and primarily chequered orange and brown, with darker wing tips, spotted white. They are strong fliers and have been recorded throughout Britain including Orkney and Shetland. The caterpillars feed mainly on wild flowers especially Thistlesand Stinging Nettles. They feed on a wide range of species in the Aster family, also giant Thistles, Helianthus and Artemisia and on plants such as runner beans. Larvae rarely occur in such numbers to cause any significant numbers to foliage, and the adults are useful pollinators as are most butterflies. Eggs are laid single on the upper leaf surface. Caterpillars feed on the underside of leaves making silk tents over their feeding areas. Each larvae sheds its outer skin 4 times as it grows. When fully fed Caterpillars are about 30mm (1 ¼") and have black spiny bodies with white dashes down their sides. The Pupa or Chrysalis stage is attached by its rear end to a mat of silk threads which the Caterpillars spins onto the plant or other surface. The life cycle can be completed in about a month, so butterflies arrive in April can produce several different generations over a Summer.


Painted Lady numbers fluctuate widely from year to year, but this butterfly is likely to be seen in the greatest numbers in late Summer. Good migration years tend to coincide with prolonged long spells of weather when winds are constantly from the South In late Spring and Summer.

There is no evidence of southward migration at the end of Summer, butterflies are simply killed by winter cold. When migrating Painted Lady can travel as much as 90 miles in 24 hours. This butterfly can be confused with the small Tortoiseshells and several species of fritillary but Painted Lady's dark wing tips with white spots are distinctive.

The most spectacular recent Painted Lady migration to Britain was in 1996, it is estimated many millions arrived and bred here. Painted Lady cannot survive Winter in Northern Europe, it is dependent on fresh migrations over wintered adults from further South every year.

The Structure and Life Cycle of a Butterfly -







Enjoy the remainder of your Summer days by admiring the beauty of these most colourful butterflies.

A special treat to you all is this really beautiful Norfolk Swallowtail taken at Strumpshaw Fen last week, the only member of the Papilionidae family. If there's a hundred things you must see before you die then I believe this beautiful butterfly has to be one of them.



Finally, a **challenge** to all **Tostock's children during the school holidays**.

C Cllr Mrs J Storey – written report for April previously circulated covering Potholes; funding for transport schemes to bring forward housing; Suffolk Waste Partnership award; Volunteers to help Suffolk get composting; Suffolk walking festival; OVO Energy Women's Tour.

D Clir Mrs S Mansel – report circulated covering Government consultation on Industrial Strategy; First Neighbourhood Plan in Mid Suffolk; New website; CIL payments; new Constitution.

Village Hall Committee – nothing to report.

Chairman's report - Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) - as a result of the Norton Rd development

Parish Council has received £4,290.10,. A further payment 5 months after the start of work, of the same amount, will be received, PC will need to decide how the money is to be spent.

PUBLIC FORUM:

Having a Christmas tree on The Green and more bulbs on The Leys – Eva Da Re offered to raise funds by cake stall at village picnic. Feeding ferrous cats near Village Hall

Request for **Village Hall Grant**: The Chairman suggested making an annual grant to the village hall rather than keep approving individual requests throughout the year.

He also mentioned that the parish council should consider having two representatives on the village hall committee.

PLANNING

Mike and Bee Bauley had written to the PC informing them that a field gate will be reinstated on the paddock adjacent to Maltsters. No planning permission required. Also that they have proposed two names for the road leading to the new aggregates yard, as a business address and postcode are required. The two names are 'Cindron Hills Road' and 'Old Woolpit Road'. Council had no objection to either, but preferred Old Woolpit Road. MSDC has final decision.

ANNUAL PARISH MEETING

The following matters were raised at the meeting on the 18th April 2018:-

Christmas tree on The Green - the Parish Council agreed to placing a Christmas Tree with lights on TheGreen. To include investigation of permanent power supply to The Green. Councillor Fletcher to investigatetree and lights. Thanks to Ms Eva Da Re for offer to raise funds for tree.

30 mph repeater sign Norton Road – this has been missing for sometime it has been reported, but not considered a priority. Villager suggested repeated letters to highways.

Norton Road Development - Discharge of Conditions for Application 4974/16- Conditions 3 (Landscaping Scheme) and 13 (Energy Strategy) planners had refused both these applications and requested resubmission with charges.

Speed Indicator Display signs – it was considered that purchasing these signs would help to slow down traffic passing through the village. The approximate cost and operating requirements was explained by the Chairman and this matter would be placed on the

The Village Hall had offered to permit 5 contractors' vehicles to be parked in car park. This had allowed Norton Road to remain clear of contractors vehicles. However this offer had been rescinded due to a greater number of vehicles subsequently being parked there. The villager considered this action to be rather severe and queried whether the Parish Council would take the matter up with the Village Hall.

Trees, Norton Road -- Some trees were in a poor state due to the roots being continually under water or affected by subsequent icy conditions during recent weather. They may need removing as they were leaning over the road and concern expressed that they may fall on passing cars. Letter to land owner.

APOLOGIES: Received and accepted from Cllr B. Alexander

ELECTION OF OFFICERS:

a). Chairman: Cllr Kearsley proposed Cllr Perks as Chairman seconded by Cllr Blundell all in agreement.

Cllr Perks was elected Chairman and signed the Declaration of Acceptance of Office.

b). Vice-Chairman: Cllr Blundell proposed Cllr Kearsley as Vice-Chairman seconded by Cllr Mansel all in agreement Cllr Kearsley was elected Vice-Chairman.

APPOINTMENT OF REPRESENTATIVES: Council discussed the following appointments:

- a). Suffolk Association of Local Councils: Any Councillor may attend a SALC event.
- b). Planning: No specific representative was necessary.
- c). Footpath Warden: Ed Wadsworth would continue as footpath warden.
- d). Tree Warden: Cllr Fletcher to continue as tree warden.
- e). Poors Charity (2): Cllr Blundell and Cllr Debenham to continue as representatives on the Poors Charity
- f). Village Hall (2): Cllr Perks and Cllr Fletcher to be the representatives on the Village Hall Committee

Cllr Kearsley proposed the appointment of representatives as stated above seconded by Cllr Mansel all in agreement REPORTS:

- a). County Councillor **Clir Mrs J Storey:** No report had been received.
- b). District Councillor **Clir Mrs S Mansel:** A report had been sent Clir Mansel also gave a brief report which included: Mid Suffolk District Council had held their Annual Council meeting on 21st May, not a lot of changes the Chair and Vice-Chair had been re-elected. MSDC had sent responses to consultations from Government. It was advised grant had been secured of £475,000 towards air source heating in Council houses. A decision had been made in regards an investment fund to allow Council to act quickly to purchaseland for investments in Mid Suffolk.
- c). Village Hall: No report had been received.
- d). Chairman: Nothing further to report.

Village Hall Grant: Cllr Perks advised he had taken the idea of an annual grant to the Village Hall Committee who advised they had a number of projects each year and proposed drawing up a list of these which the Parish Council could fund all or some of the projects outlined. The next meeting of the Village Hall will be held in September allowing the Parish Council to have the list and possible costs before setting the Precept. Council discussed and were happy with the arrangement but asked if they could look at the list in conjunction with the Village Hall budget and end of year statement

PLANNING: The public attending the meeting were asked if they would like to comment. A number of comments were given including: A site survey had taken place, concern was expressed at the flooding coming off the field already and this would be exacerbated when concrete was covering the ground.

Photographs were provided of water sitting on the field.

Perkins Way - Drainage Proposals: Full details on Village Website

NORTON ROAD: The public attending the meeting were asked if they wished to comment and an email which had been received was read out.

- a). **Development:** Council discussed including: A S.106 agreement must have been signed, Council expressed concern if the affordable houses may not be built, it was advised the reasons for refusal were the planting scheme and energy strategy (MSDC require supporting evidence). A question was asked on drainage it was advised the developers are still working on it as far as was known. A brief discussion was held on drainage issues on the site particularly concern at the amount of water coming off site. This is not a formal consultation but the Parish Council may still comment, it was agreed to send the following:
- Tostock Parish Council hope MSDC are working with the developer to deliver the affordable housing in a timely manner without sacrificing the landscaping and energy strategy as the community of Tostock feels strongly that there is a need for affordable housing in the village.
- b). **Trees Adjacent to Norton Road**: It had been agreed at the last meeting to write to the landowner asking for the possible dangerous trees to be inspected and dealt with accordingly.
- c). **Ditch Adjacent to Norton Road:** It was agreed to write to the landowner asking for the ditches to be cleared.

The Clerk to write to the landowner on Norton Road in regards the trees and ditch.

VILLAGE MATTERS

- a) The Leys: The Chair advised the pond had been cleared as well as the track but future maintenance needs to be given thought as the tracks will need spraying once or twice a year. Cllr Kearsley proposed approaching local contractors for a price for spraying the track seconded by Cllr Perks all in agreement. It was suggested a working party could be put together once a year to clear the pond, an article to be placed in the Chronicle.
- b). Gateway signage update: This had been ordered and it was advised the monies had come out of earmarked reserves.
- c). **Telephone box:** An update was given the materials had been ordered as soon as they arrive the works to be undertaken it was hoped in the next couple of weeks.
- d). **Dog waste bin at Village Hall:** The clerk to check whether MSDC is able to empty a dog waste bin within the car park at the village hall. The clerk to check with SCC whether dog bins at two new sites could be attached to finger posts.
- e). **Request for Power Cables to be laid underground:** The clerk to write to UK Power Networks asking if power cables could be laid underground as Tostock is in a conservation area.
- f). **Speed Stickers for Bins:** The Chair advised he had contacted SCC Highways to ask if they would object to speed stickers being placed on bins and is currently waiting for an answer. An article to go in the Chronicle. To place on next agenda.
- g). Christmas Tree on The Green: Cllr Fletcher updated Council including cost of provision of 2m tree approximately £150 (the tree would need to be below 5m otherwise guy-lines would be needed), to provide own lights approximately £280 for 900 bulbs or £165 for 500 bulbs but you were able to add bulbs at a later date these were all low voltage LED white bulbs. The stand was discussed and it was agreed a sunken pipe which could be mown over was the most suitable support for the tree. All in agreement for Cllr Fletcher to acquire 3 quotes for the work. The provision of power was discussed with a trench needing to be dug as well as the possible costs; it was asked if solar power could be used. It was agreed the permanent provision of power on The Green could also be used for other events throughout the year. Council were happy for Cllr Fletcher to get a quotation from UK Power Networks.
- h). **Speed Indicator Displays:** Cllr Perks advised he had received a quote for SID. A self evaluation on the positioning of the poles, with checklist provided by SCC highways website was also needed. A notice to be placed in The Chronicle for volunteers to periodically move display.
- i). Litter: A resident had asked for a litter pick. Council discussed Cllr Mansel advised MSDC provide a litter pick kit which is available to share with another village and includes hi-vis jackets, gloves etc but would need a co-ordinator. Safety was an issue especially if picking along Church Road. Council were in agreement there was no objection to a litter picking event being organised if the resident wished to place an article in the Chronicle asking for volunteers.
- j). **Map indicating village ditches**: The clerk to ask County Cllr Jane Storey if a map of the village ditches could be supplied from Highways. The Clerk to also ask SCC Highways.


