

SUFFOLK LOCAL HISTORY COUNCIL

In the 1970's Heather Spencer and friends got together to form The Past and Present Society

The aim of this Society is to record various changes that have taken place in a village and any events of importance.

Most villages have an appointed Recorder who submits an Annual Report to the secretary.

These reports are then placed in the Suffolk office for anyone wishing to do any research in the future.

Jean Wheeler and Reta Stevens have been recorders for Tostock for many years.

The last two Chronicles have printed extracts from Tostock Past and Present Village Archives.

These notes were made when the Suffolk Local History Society had their annual day meeting in the village some 30 years ago with a walk around the village. Unfortunately, these notes were not checked or updated before the reprint. For the benefit of our new residents and possible future researchers we are writing a series of updated versions (2018)

Beginning with:

THE VILLAGE GREEN

of the village history.

This is the focal and oldest part of the village. The Workhouse or sometimes called Town House was under the supervision of STOW UNION and stood where Croft Cottage now stand. The well was left in the garden and the dividing wall between "Croft Cottage" and "Green Farm Cottage" still remains.

Further eastwards is a thatched cottage "The Crossings", Originally the garden of this property extended to the bungalow "snapdragon". The owner of "The Crossings" wanted to 'downsize' and sold off a large area of the garden in the 1970's.

The district valuer met the Parish Council and a wayleave price for access was agreed.

On the other side is the flagpole and bus shelter behind which sits "Beech Tree House" where sweets and tobacco were sold from a front room. Then it comes to the pub "Gardners" originally the "Gardiners Arms" then "Gardeners". The pub also had an iconic sign with a biblical text which drew people to come and record info for their collection but unfortunately was taken down some time ago.

The Trackway on the Northside from Flatts Lane to the Chapel, belonged to the district council, from the chapel to the west end was only a narrow footpath for access to the properties this was eventually widened and tarmacked. At one time this all belonged to the Manor of Little Haugh (Norton). Captain Errington who at the time was Chairman and Clerk to the Parish Council undertook to find the Lord of the Manor. After many months, whilst searching through some old documents at Tostock House for Tostock, came across the deeds naming Sir John Woods as the Lord. The two mem met and Sir John sold the deed to Captain Errington for One Shilling (two and a half new pence) and he gave the deed to the Parish Council.

Tostock then became the only Parish Council in England to also be Lord of the Manor.

To the East was the most painted and photographed beautiful horse chestnut tree called "Queen of the Green" unfortunately showed signs of disease, alas the Parish Council decided to fell instead of trying to treat.

A circular was distributed around the village for a replacement and there was an overwhelming request for an English Oak. It was replaced with an American oak and called The Tostock Twig.

This competition was started in 1963 and alternated between The Fison Trophy for small villages.

Tostock worked together and won or came second in every competition! This competition ceased in the 1980's and because Tostock won so many times the trophy was offered to them for good. Provided it was kept it in good repair.

TOSTOCK RECORDER

Extracts from Tostock Past and Present Village Archives

- Listed Grade II Farmhouse: Timber-framed, encased in brick.

 20. TICEHURST: date 1599 on carved beam on front elevation. Farmhouse on what was the old turnpike road between Bury and Stowmarket. Now situated between village road and A.14. Castellated roof on rear extension. Early 19C. swimming pool was originally in front garden. 1996: old barns converted into commercial units. Gravel pits in Cindron Hills.
- MUSHROOM COTTAGE: c.1790 (bottom of New Road) originally the lodge to Tostock Place - modern extension to rear.
- 22. TOSTOCK PLACE :(entrances from New Road and Church Road) : original date unknown. Thought to have been the home of North family. Sir Dudley North purchased Tostock estate in 1638 his son Sir Roger North became Solicitor General in 1684. In 1674 Hearth Tax returns, 19 chimneys recorded here. House rebuilt in 1812, by George Brown , Bury banker around the old core. Wing of house taken down in 1950's. Listed "crinkle-crankle" walls surrounding early 19C. walled kitchen garden can be seen clearly from southern part of churchyard.

Squash court and stables now converted into houses.

During World War II the house and grounds were requisitioned for British and


American troops and Italian P.O.W.s.

23. ST. ANDREW'S CHURCH : LISTED GRADE I.

A 12C.Chancel, west 14C. Tower, Porch c.1400, early 14C. font with pagan green man carvings, double hammer-beam roof, perpendicular windows, medieval benches, with carved pew ends. Late 17C. altar rails,

Listed Tombstone south of Church Cherubs on headstone - skull on footstone - S.H. 1688 date.

Churchyard extended in 1907 & again in 1955 when the wall was built by voluntary labour.

24. TOSTOCK OLD HALL: c.1600: There appears to have been a house on this site, long before this date. Listed Grade II. Remodelled in 1850 in GOthic style. Jettied upper


floor. Originally thought to have been moated. Panelled room, fine staircase. Timber frame & plastered original house.

Dissenters held meetings here in Barn, licence in 1839 issued - Mrs. Brown in residence, who later helpedfinance the building of Woolpit Room(Plymouth Brethren), where group was well established.

Thought to have been a water mill in meadow near stream. 1088 road probably Roman road.

COUNTRYLIFE - D. POOLE Number 21

I've said before how I thrive on nostalgia, so on the morning of the 11th November 2017 I should wake up to the knowledge that a certain Iconic Steam Locomotive none other than The Flying Scotsman would be passing through our area from Norwich to Ipswich and back again, coming as close to within 5 miles from Tostock. I simply had to be there with my camera. The announcement having been broadcast on BBC Radio Suffolk and Anglia Tv. The Flying Scotsman is almost a 100 years old and still going strong. The question I was now faced with was where would the best view point be to see and photograph my favourite and the most famous train in the world. The conclusion I came to was Needham Lakes or Needham Station Platform, so I chose the latter which gives me two good opportunities to get what I'm hoping for and will be the perfect photograph. The train departing from Norwich at about 8 am passing through Needham at 8.55 am and was due back to Needham from Ipswich at 11.40 am. To capture the perfect photo from a photographers point of view, what you have to consider is the light conditions, the speed of the train, the ISO and F.Stop settings and the shutter speed of the camera, get it wrong and the opportunities have gone. I understand that the train will be travelling along at about 80 m.p.h. so when it did arrive at Needham for the first time it came into view ¼ mile away, 440 yards in front of me, exactly 11 ¼ seconds later it had gone passed me. 11 ¼ seconds is all I had to get this photo, however, I did run a second camera which I mounted on a tripod and took some video film, so some of the photos are frames from the videos. My first attempt did leave me a little disappointed, unfortunately the second attempt at 11.40 am return visit was not much better as a woman walked right in front of my camera as I was about to press the button, all I got was her head. I did manage a few photos before that but I was left disappointed. However the Steam Locomotive was travelling back to Peterborough from Norwich via Ely later on in the afternoon so my only hope now would be to go to Lakenheath Fen RSPB site where the line runs parallel through the site. The entire second run from Ipswich took 40 seconds from start to finish before it was out of sight again. My brother from Ipswich faired much better than me as he was able to photograph it when it stopped and turned around. So off I set for Lakenheath and hopefully it would be third time lucky.


LNER Class A3 4472 Flying Scotsman is a Pacific steam locomotive built in 1923 for the London and North Eastern Railway (LNER) at Doncaster Works to a design of Nigel Gresley. It was employed on long distance express East Coast Main Line trains by the LNER and its successors, British Railways Eastern and North Eastern Regions, notably on the London to Edinburgh Flying Scotsman train service after which it was named. The locomotive set two world records for steam traction, becoming the first steam

locomotive to be officially authenticated at reaching 100 miles per hour (160.9 km/h) on 30th November 1934 and then setting a record for the longest non-stop run by a steam locomotive when it ran 422 miles (679 km) on the 8th August 1989 while in Australia. Retired from regular service in 1963 after covering 2.08 million miles. The Flying Scotsman gained considerable fame in preservation under the successful ownership of Alan Pegler, William McAlpine, Tony Marchington and finally the National Railway Museum (NRM). As well as hauling enthusiast specials in the United Kingdom, the locomotive toured extensively in the United States and Canada from 1969 until 1973 and Australia in 1988/89. The Flying Scotsman has been described as the world's most famous steam locomotive. In a 2015 poll which questioned people from four continents it was again ranked the most famous locomotive. The Flying Scotsman was something of a flagship locomotive for the LNER. it represented the company at the British Empire Exhibition at Wembley Park in 1924 and 1925. Before this event in February 1924 it acquired its name and the new number of 4472. From then on it was commonly used for promotional purposes

With suitably modified valve gear, this locomotive was one of five Gresley Pacifics selected to haul the prestigious non-stop Flying Scotsman train service from London to Edinburgh, hauling the inaugural train on the 1st May 1928. For this, the locomotive ran with a new version of the large eight-wheel tender which held nine long tons of coal. This and the usual facility for water replenishment from the water trough system enabled them to travel the 392 miles (631 km) from London to Edinburgh in eight hours non-stop. The tender included a corridor connection and tunnel through the water tank giving access to the locomotive cab from the train so that the driver and fireman could be changed without stopping the train. The following year the locomotive appeared in the film "The Flying Scotsman" While the Great Western Railway locomotive City of Truro had previously been unofficially timed at running in excess of 100 mph (160.9 km/h) 4472 became the first steam locomotive to be officially authenticated at this speed on the 30th November 1934, driven by Bill Sparshatt and running a light test train. It earned a place in the land speed record for railed vehicles, the publicity-conscious LNER made much of the fact. The locomotive ran with its corridor tender between April 1928 and October 1936, after which it reverted to the original type. In July 1938 it was paired with a streamlined non-corridor tender, and ran with this type until withdrawal. On the 22nd August 1928 an improved version of this Pacific type, classified A3 appeared, older A3 locomotives were later rebuilt to conform. On 25th April 1945, A1-class locomotives not yet built were re-classified A10 to make way for newer Thompson and Peppercorn Pacifics . Flying Scotsman emerged from Doncaster. Works on the 4th January 1947 as an A3 having received a boiler with the long "banjo" dome of the type it carries today.

There's an old phrase or saying that goes "Strike whilst the iron is hot" or the one "Lightning never strikes twice" well on the 17th February 2018 3 months after the Flying Scotsman passed through there was another steam locomotive The Oliver Cromwell also passing by, this time coming up from London via Ipswich to Norwich. On this occasion I decided to go and stand at Haughley bends as it flew passed about 11.30 am. This is the photo I managed to achieve on this occasion.

Should you be interested there are some nice places to visit where you can see steam trains around Suffolk and Norfolk — Bressingham Museum, Mid Suffolk Light Railway at Brockford with just a small length of track. Mid Suffolk Railway started with nothing as the track had all gone and no rolling stock remained and what buildings that had been on the line were spread and facing dereliction. Now today you arrive to find not only the rolling stock and Museum but also a refreshment room, shop, ticket office as well as original buildings housing its workshops. Not only do they hold special events like the 1940's events, but also in the Summer a full afternoon driver training (following a safety briefing) allowing anyone the opportunity to climb on the footplate to act as fireman and then as driver taking control of a steam locomotive and towing its coaches along the full length of the line. Since the mid 60's the scenic North Norfolk Railway affectionally known as the Poppy Line covers the 5 miles route between Holt and Sheringham and has some of the finest views of the North Norfolk coast. It was extended to Holt in the late eighties. With its proximity to the Norfolk coast the North Norfolk Railway has always been a favourite East Anglian railway of mine. Bure Valley Railway opened in 1990 and runs for 9 miles as a 15-inch gauge railway between delightful Aylsham and scenic Wroxham on the Norfolk Broads, sharing its entire length with a footpath giving the walker lovely views of the trains as they pass. Close by is the 4 miles long 10 1/4-inch narrow gauge Wells and Walsingham Railway. It has the charming character at the controls of both Garrett engines "Norfolk Hero" (1986) and "Norfolk Heroine" (2011) serving visitors to the area as well as the pilgrims making their way to the delightful National Shrine of our Lady at Walsingham. This is another line offering Driver experience sessions. Do attempt to get aboard and work up to full steam ahead. Long may these majestic Steam trains reign and grace our Tostock countryside for many more years to come.

DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST

Cllr R Perks - Item 7 Finance and Item 8 Planning

CO-OPTION OF APPLICANT

Details of the applicant had been previously circulated to all councillors and following a brief discussion Cllr Perks proposed co-opting Mr Nicholas Cytacki to the Council. Seconded by Cllr Mrs Mansel – all in favour. Declaration of Acceptance was duly signed and Cllr Cytacki was invited to join the members.

WRITTEN REPORTS

REPORTS

Public Forum:

- Complaint about the dog bin outside the Village Hall being emptied by villager instead of MSDC.
- Request for the Parish Council to install a bin in Norton Road by the bench further up the road
- State of Flatts Lane with excess water making it difficult for walkers to use the footpath
- Potholes should be reported to SCC along with the problem in Flatts Lane Chairman has taken a number of photos around the village including Flatts Lane and will report this 'on line'
- Ditch outside village Hall has been cleared
- Large pieces of tree need to be cleared being dealt with under agenda item 'Norton Road'

Chairman's report - items covered elsewhere on the agenda -nothing to add.

FINANCE

Financial Risk Assessment: Confirmed at the December 2017 meeting.

Playground Inspection: Councillors agreed to donate this year's cost to the Village Hall and to include this item in future annual grant payments to them when agreeing the precept. Proposed by Cllr Mrs Mansel, seconded by Cllr Kearsley – all in favour.

Lawn Mower Service: In addition to the one quote obtained by C Buckle, it was hoped a further two quotes of no more than £1,000 would be sought before councillors reached a decision at the next meeting.

PLANNING

Councillors agreed that the following application needed to be displayed and discussed after villagers had been given the opportunity to comment. It was therefore unanimously agreed to hold a separate Planning Meeting on the 15th March.

00780/18 Land adj. Foresters, New Road: Severance of land and erection of one detached bungalow and creation of new vehicular access.

00927/18 Foresters, New Road: Conversion of a detached bungalow into two detached dwellings Appledores Farm (Application 02353/17 refused)

CROFT HOUSE

Cllr Blundell provided a verbal report to councillors on his meeting with the owners and following a brief discussion the meeting unanimously agreed the Council should still ask the solicitors to write to the owners pointing out that the widening of their access would encroach on the green and if they intended to proceed with this there was a procedure to follow which the solicitor should outline.

NORTON ROAD DEVELOPMENT

A number of villagers have been in touch with the water authority and developers regarding the problem of surface water. MSDC had admitted errors were made but it was a SCC problem and not MSDC. There was some agreement between the land owner and developers but MSDC had not followed the recommendations provided by the water board consultant. Additionally there were problems with the pumping station.

Councillors discussed how to progress the matter further. Cllr Kearsley proposed drawing up a draft letter for the clerk to send to the Chief Executive, MSDC. Proposed by Cllr Mrs Debenham, seconded by Cllr Kearsley – all in favour.

Councillors agreed that Planning enforcement should also contacted and in particular referring to Condition 9 which the Parish Council considered was not being adhered to.

VILLAGE MATTERS

- a) The Leys/Green tracks: this will be repaired at the beginning of April

Reducing Speeding

At last the Parish Council has been given approval by Suffolk County Council to install village gateways. Gateways are a recommended way of reducing vehicles speeding. They will be installed at four locations, the Welcome to Tostock sign before The Leys, Norton Road north at 30 mph sign, New Road at 30 mph sign and Tostock sign/30 mph sign near the church. It has unfortunately taken nearly three years to get this approval, you will realise how frustrating the process has been to get to this point!

Many of you have asked about Speed Indicator Displays (SIDs) for the village, there is yet another formal and bureaucratic process to follow to obtain approval for SIDs.

One requirement is that a minimum of two people must be present when a SID is being placed or removed, or batteries changed, with one person whose role is to watch over the operation including observing oncoming traffic.

For the Parish Council to apply for an SID we would need at least two and ideally more volunteers to have our application considered. To be effective the SID would have to be attached to a roadside post and moved or removed within 4 weeks.

Following a £1.2 million grant, significant improvements have been made to the visiting areas at the castle.


