

Sierra Leone is the world's most dangerous place to become a mum. Every day 10 women die from giving birth. In Sawula district, the community struggle with a clinic which has no electricity and only two delivery beds.

Jebbeh is heavily pregnant but as her baby grows, it's not joy that fills her heart, but fear. When Jebbeh's sister Fatmata went in to labour, there were so few ambulances that Fatmata had no choice but to walk for three hours under the baking sun, to the nearest hospital. The journey was long and with every step Fatmata struggled to keep walking.

Jebbeh told us: 'My sister was crying out with hunger. She died on the side of the road. She never gave birth.'

This Christian Aid Week, together, we can make childbirth safe for mums and babies. Through our gifts and prayers, we can help give the world's poorest mums a chance to live.

Matthew Walker (Tostock)

Some of you may remember Matthew who at 8 years old was playing the organ in Tostock and other churches in the area.

From 9 years old he also began to play the clarinet through Suffolk County Music service's subsidised lessons. In 2016, during sixth form, Matthew was principal clarinettist for the Suffolk Youth Orchestra and was winner of the West Suffolk Young Musician of the year competition.

In September 2016 Matthew went to study for a Batchelor's degree in music at the University of Nottingham. Whilst studying there, he has taken on leadership roles in several music societies including managing the auditioned University of Nottingham Wind Orchestra and conducting the large Concert Band. He has also been a member of the University Philharmonia Orchestra where in October last year, after a successful audition he performed as the soloist for Copland's Concerto for Clarinet.

Last July, Matthew attended the Belgian clarinet academy course in Ostend, coordinated by Dr Robert Spring from Arizona State University. The week featured masterclasses and recitals, collaborating with professionals and students from all over the world.

In September, Matthew was asked to stand in for a member of the National Youth Orchestra during their outreach concerts in Nottingham schools.

In a few weeks, Matthew will be playing in Nottingham for the premiere of Elizabeth Kelly's new opera Losing Her Voice about the life and career of the American opera singer Geraldine Farrah. From this September, Matthew will be studying for a Master of Music in performance at The Royal Northern College of Music in Manchester.

Matthew has been asked to play as a concerto soloist with Suffolk Sinfonia Orchestra at their concert in the **Apex on Saturday 22nd June.** It would be lovely if some of our friends and villagers who have followed his progress so far could come and support him at his first professional performance in Bury St Edmunds.



Extracts from the Tostock Archives

Tostock Church School - Part 2

(Reminiscences of "Honey" Mrs Elsie Manning (née knock) in 1974)

In this installment Elsie recall people & incidents from her childhood days at Tostock School between 1904 and 1911. Elsie lived in a house called "Sunnyside", part of the house on the Green now called Jasmine Cottage. Elsie's mother had a white and yellow Jasmine growing round the rustic porch and this may well be how the house got its name. Elsie did not have far to walk when she heard the school bell ringing. This bell was centrally placed in the roof in a little turret which is no longer there. A second bell was to hasten latecomers and senior pupils thought it quite an honour to be allowed to ring the bell.

There were two teachers in their twenties, Miss Grace Ingram and Miss Mabel Ingram. Their father use to drive them to Tostock each morning from Elmswell in his pony and trap and they were never late. He fetched them in the afternoon. The timetable of lessons hardly varied. From 9am to 12noon there was Scripture, Arithmetic and Reading. From 2pm to 4pm it was History and Geography. In Scripture lessons the catechism and Bible passages were learnt by heart. During the mid-morning break there was always "Drill" with dumb-bells, outside in the playground if it was fine. If wet it was indoors in time with the piano.

Discipline was very strict and the pupils had a healthy respect for Mss Grace especially, as she would stand for no nonsense. Miss Mabel was a gentler character. She played the piano for hymns on Friday morning (instead of scripture) and for singing lessons. She was Elsie's first music teacher. Elsie was very fond of her, but was almost afraid of coughing during a piano lesson. Elsie was once caned by Miss Grace and on occasions Elsie saw platts flying when Miss Grace boxed their ears.

Elsie thought they were good teachers because they just had to learn, and she never forgot her tables. She remembers that she could read by four and loved it. Sometimes she read to the whole school. A strict teacher was probably necessary because of the number of children in the classroom. Much use was made of the blackboard for all subjects, and handwriting was done in copy books in that beautiful but now old fashioned cursive script.

Tostock's rector, the Rev. Julian Tuck took Sunday School in the building on Sunday afternoons and the children had to learn all the Prayer Book collects. He was chairman of the school managers and came to the school nearly every morning from the old Rectory. If any of the bigger boys had been really troublesome he would deal with them for Miss Grace by caning them across a desk, "four of the best", in front of everybody. This was normal practice for someone in his position and this godfearing man should not be judged too harshly.

In the next installment Mrs Elsie Manning recalls her return to the school in 1917 to work as a pupil/teacher.

COUNTRY LIFE - D. POOLE Number 26

For this edition just when our humble hedgehog is about to come out from its dormancy and hibernation, now is a good time to bring it into the limelight and give it some recognition it deserves. The hedgehog is one of Britains most popular mammals and is the gardeners best friend. Eating slugs, worms, beetles, caterpillars, millipedes and earwigs, these are the main stay of their diet.

I had better practice what I preach, so what I thought I would do is make a hedgehog box and encourage them into my garden and possibly get them to breed in the box. If I can encourage a few other people across Tostock to do the same then perhaps this time next year we can all have a get together up at the local pub over a pint of beer for a report back and a discussion on any successes we may have had. The poor hedgehog is very much in decline over these recent years and is crying out for help so we must do what we can to protect and save them.

Just before Christmas last December I was invited to go to a talk /come presentation by Ali North over at Lackford (Suffolk Wildlife Trust headquarters) **Ali North** who is SWT's hedgehog officer and campaigns officer and a charming young lady who was full of confidence and ability. In September 2016 Ali was appointed to lead a project to make Ipswich the most hedgehog friendly town in the U.K. Two years on what a fantastic job she has done, putting Ipswich well and truly on the map. The result is just amazing

history. Here is a small part of her report in the recent edition of the Suffolk Wildlife Trust's magazine all about the Ipswich project in her own words -

For Suffolk Wildlife Trust, knowledge of the growing importance of urban populations was a clarion call and we got to work. Our project, supported by players of the National Lottery, local benefactors and British Hedgehog Preservation Society, aimed to

promote hedgehog-friendly garden and land management practises, while creating and connecting habitat. Importantly it would also provide lessons for other towns and leave a legacy for local conservation action in Ipswich.

The need to engage communities, businesses and land managers across Ipswich meant the project was undeniably ambitious. But the topic of hedgehog conservation really has captured the imagination of the town, with a huge audience embracing the project and the simple actions that can be taken in back gardens to help local hedgehog populations.

In fact, through a series of talks, walks, park events and workshops the Trust has now promoted hedgehog friendly land management to over 6,000 people and recruited 53 hedgehog champions – a network of people dedicated to acting for and spreading awareness of hedgehogs. The project's reach has been greater than any of us hoped. A total of 780 hedgehog-accessible gardens have been logged, while advice and training has been given to land managers with influence over 9km of habitat. Meetings with planners and ecologists have also contributed to a 25% increase in planning applications in Ipswich that include conditions for hedgehog permeable fencing. Talking to those who have a strong connection to Ipswich's green spaces has been another really important part of the

project. Discussions with more than 100 allotment holders have given us useful insights into the level of chemicals used and attitudes toward hedgehogs-friendly alternatives with 62% already having tried hedgehog-friendly methods of slug control. Community

surveying and assistance in population research for Nottingham Trent University has helped us better understand the hedgehogs of Ipswich and contribute to national efforts to better estimate population densities. We have walked a total of 459km on night

transects and collectively spent 159 hours searching for hedgehogs by torchlight, our radio-tracking activities had us searching far and wide for some hedgehogs, especially for the affectionately named "Adventure Hog" who seemingly dropped off our radio was

eventually found over 1km away in a village on the outskirts of Ipswich. He wasn't the only wayward hedgehog! One forced us to lie face down in a garden while we waited for her to emerge from a nest under a garden shed. This behaviour coupled with the very large radio-tracking aerial resulted in some very funny looks in the local neighbourhood and some enquiries over whether we were tracking unlicensed TV owners, aliens or ghosts!

Not all of our surveys have looked so unusual – our community footprint and camera surveys have involved over 400 people monitoring for hedgehog presence in allotments, parks, school grounds and gardens, checking trail cameras and tunnels in the mornings for signs of hedgehog activity. Exciting footage include some very impressive hedgehog squabbles, moon walking hogs and bathing Tawny Owls. Of those providing feedback, 88% of participants took garden-scale action for hedgehogs as a result of their survey activities – proof that people care about the wildlife they know is on their doorsteps and want to do something to help them. Our online hedgehog map is helping us record sightings and actions taken for hedgehogs across the county.

Throughout the two-year project there have been an additional 758 hedgehog sightings recorded in Ipswich and nearly 2,000 across the whole of Suffolk. We hope residents across Ipswich and Suffolk will continue to log their sightings, but also their hedgehog-friendly garden features to help us better understand how connected different parts of the town and country are becoming for our local hedgehog population. Eleven schools have been involved in the Ipswich hedgehog project to date – one even created a hedgehog home replica of their own school building! By analysing some of our learning activities we have seen an increase in hedgehog knowledge in children and families through our assemblies, trails and hedgehog quizzes. Our Hog Spotter Activity Jotter is encouraging potential young conservationists to learn even more about hedgehogs and this can be downloaded for free from the hedgehog page of our website. **Thanks Ali**







Hedgehogs are our only spiny mammal and are immediately recognisable. They have around 5,000 closely-packed hollow, creamy-white spines, becoming brown at the base and pure white at the tip. Just behind the point is a dark chocolate-brown band. On their underside hedgehogs have coarse grey-brown fur. By rolling up into a ball and erecting their spines hedgehogs can protect themselves from most natural enemies. They have a short inconspicuous tail, small ears and relatively long legs, normally hidden under a skirt of long hair. They are usually thought of as slow animals but they can move up to 40 meters a minute. They are mostly active at night or after heavy rainfall, and use their keen sense of smell to find food and alert them to danger. Between November and the end of March when food is scarce hedgehogs hibernate to conserve energy, remaining largely inactive.

Their head-body length – up to 30cm, Tail length – 2cm, Weight – 450-1500 g, Lifespan – About a half die in their first year, average lifespan is about two years, but a small percentage can reach five years. Reproduction – up to seven blind spineless offspring are usually born between May and August in a nest of leaves and grass. Pure white spines appear after birth and are replaced within a few weeks by darker spines that grow through. The young are weaned at about four weeks and become independent shortly afterwards.

Habitat – Woodland edges, hedgerows in meadowland and rough pasture. They avoid wet areas or large pine forests. Predators – Occasionally badgers, and foxes. Threats – Habitat loss due to agricultural change and pesticides which reduce the abundance of prey. Road deaths may be important locally.

Status and conservation – Hedgehogs were made a priority species in the UK Biodiversity Action Plan Population size and distribution – GB population1,100,000. The population trend is unknown but there is evidence that the population is declining. Hedgehogs are found throughout the British Isles including urban areas, but are absent from some of the Scottish Islands.





Here are some do's and don'ts for garden Hedgehogs -

Don't use slug pellets or pesticides as hedgehogs eat slugs

Provide log piles, long grass, rotting leaves and nectar-rich flowers to encourage insects that hedgehogs like to eat

Make your garden safe for hedgehogs – They are good swimmers, but if you have a pond they need a way to climb out.

Check too for netting which hedgehogs can get tangled in if not tightly secured.

Make sure there are hedgehog-sized gaps in your garden fence and encourage your neighbours to do the same. A 13cm/5" gap should allow even the largest hedgehog through.

Cut a hole in a wooden panel, make a gap under gate, or ask a contractor to include a hole in a newly installed concrete gravel board. Dig under your fence to avoid cutting, or use a tunnel cinder block to deter use by pets. Look for droppings, set up a night camera, make a footprint tunnel or feeding station to see if you have a visiting hedgehog.

Hedgehog droppings are dark, textured and contain shiny bits of invertebrates.

Food – extra food and water can be a great help, but can't substitute natural foraging habitat. Tinned dog food mixed with crushed dog biscuits and a little water, or a specialist hedgehog food will help supplement their diet.

NEVER put out bread and milk as it makes hedgehogs ill.

Be Less Tidy – let autumn leaves rot where they fall, or rake them into piles. Long grass areas are best cut in winter and bramble areas in autumn.

CHECK for hedgehogs when you cut long grass or brambles as these areas are used for nesting.

It would be a pity if we were to lose these shy elusive and most adorable creatures from our countryside – the countryside wouldn't be the same without them.
