Tostock has a proud history of success in the Suffolk 'Best Kept Village' competition which we would like to resurrect.

A meeting was recently convened under the auspices of the

Parish Council to look into ways of improving and

maintaining the appearance of Tostock with the

primary aim of keeping our village looking good for everyone's benefit.



As a result of that meeting it was agreed that a series of 'Village Tidy Days' would be a good idea to undertake the necessary tasks and raise awareness of the need to respect the village and do all we can to keep it looking at its best.

A group of 4 people agreed to get together and identify what is required and make plans for getting it done.

After an initial walk round the entire village and some initial discussions the group have identified the following aspects requiring some attention:

There is a low level litter problem which needs to be addressed,

Some of the road signs are rather dirty and would benefit from cleaning,

Some of the road name signs have become tatty and should be repainted where required,

Some of the verges are overgrown and untidy and require tidying and cutting back,

Some footpaths have become overgrown and difficult to walk and require some attention.

If you have further ideas about what should be done please let us know.

Actions to address the areas we have identified are being planned but a key aspect of this initiative is to involve as many people as possible to raise awareness of the initiative and foster a culture of ownership by the entire village. With this in mind we are planning a series of proposed 'Tidy Tostock' days for 2019. The dates proposed are the *Saturdays 9th March*, 1st June, 7th September and 30th November.

We are looking for volunteers to join us at **10.00** am on Saturday 9th March at the Village Hall to help with some of the tasks.

We understand not everyone will be able to join on the planned days but if people are unable to volunteer then they can all do their own thing by making an extra effort to maintain the frontages of their own properties.

Parish Council Election 2nd May 2019 - Nominations Needed!

Help Tostock achieve a full parish council. Make a difference for your village and community – become a Parish Councillor.

A thriving Parish Council is needed to help look after the interests, environment and facilities of Tostock village. By offering some time; sharing your particular knowledge and experiences; and getting involved in areas of interest or concern, you can help make a difference.

The term for a parish council is four years after which a new council must be elected. The next election for councillors will be held on 2nd May 2019. Tostock Parish Council may have up to 9 councillors. Candidates must be at least one of the following:

- an elector of the parish
- during the whole of the last 12 months must have occupied, either as owner or tenant,
 land or other premises in the parish.
- their principal or only place of work is in the parish
- they live within 4.8 kilometres (3 miles) of the parish boundary

Candidate Nominations Open Tuesday 19th March 2019. Nominations Close 4.00pm on Wednesday 3rd April 2019

Where there are more candidates than vacancies, an election must be held. If after nominations close there are an equal number or fewer candidates than there are vacancies, all candidates are elected unopposed, and no election is needed. If after the election there are less than 3 councillors, the district council may temporarily appoint persons to bring the council up to strength.

It is anticipated that some existing councillors will be standing again as councillors. However, to achieve a full council additional candidates are needed. To have a fully elected council has certain benefits. The council would gain some additional powers, plus the potential to attract additional revenue through the Community Infrastructure Levy. It is hoped that there are potential candidates in the village that would be attracted to joining the council.

Tostock deserves a representative council to make decisions affecting the future of the village. Why not join the council and add your support and help it maintain and improve the village.

The Things He Did - The Story of Holy Week.

A very good friend of mine just recently introduced me to Scottish country singer come songwriter Isla Grant by lending me his video of her, although Isla has been around for a good few years I must admit I had never heard of her until now, but I immediately liked what I heard. Not only does she write her own music but lyrics as well. Song 3 - Mothers Chair

There's an old armchair and it means the world to me for I used to sit there upon my mothers knee and she'd read to me the stories that children love to hear now there is no-one to sit in mothers chair I still recall the many times the words she would say to me fight for all your dreams, turn them to reality but as I sat by her in wonder her eyes held so much pride I knew against all others I had mother on my side mothers chair is old and dusty and colours fading fast to me it holds a memory of happy days gone past like the way she'd smile and hold my hand and brush away the tears now there is no-one to sit in mothers chair now the old chair is standing where she left it that day when god came to visit and carry her away and every time I see it looks so cold and bare now there is no-one to sit in mothers chair there's an old armchair and it means the world to me for I used to sit there upon my mothers knee and she'd read to me the stories that children love to hear now there's no-one to sit in mothers chair

I'm going to stick my neck out and say that it is God who wants us to be the same and equal. There comes a time in life when circumstances and situations touches all our hearts and we want to cry. Extracts from the Tostock Archives

Tostock Church School - Part 1 (Reminiscences of "Honey" Mrs Elsie Manning (née knock) in 1974)

Tostock School was a two-roomed building, later becoming the village hall, before being converted into a private dwelling. Elsie Manning was a pupil and a teacher at the school.

It seems that before the school's foundation in 1874 some village children received their schooling (which was not free) at Heatherdene. It used to be 2 cottages, and was in those days the last house on the left as one walks down to the church. In 1874 the new Church School was built with money largely found by the village. The Chairman of the Managers was Tostock's rector, the Rev. Julian Tuck. Another Manager was Lady Malcolm, wife of Sir James Malcolm who lived at Tostock Place. Yet another early manager was Mr Robert Gardiner, grandfather of Elsie Manning's sister in law Mrs Lawrence Knock. Robert Gardiner was a veteran of the Crimean War who had been decorated after the fighting at Balaklava, Inkerman and Sebastopol. He took part in all these battles. He retired to Tostock in 1875, sang in the church choir (then a strong one of 20 voices), became churchwarden for a time, and also "Mine Host" at the Royal William. Ted Everitt thinks he may well have been the last.

Elsie Knock, as she then was, went to school in 1904 at the age of 5. She stayed until 1911. Her schoolmates included many of the Haselwood clan, and such well known characters as Jack, Ted and Roly Everitt, Hilda Everett (later Mrs Wheeldon), the brothers Herbert and Vic Huffey, their cousin Frank Huffey and Elsie's brother Lawrie Knock who was there from 2009 to 1914. Attending the school were about 75 children rising to about 100 in 1914.

They were all Tostock children, for families were large in those days. Mrs Manning particularly remembers the Buckle family (not connected to the Buckle family who reside in the village today) which was as big as a football team. She clearly remembers them all and their names; Jack, Winnie, Alvah, Claude, Abby, Marjorie, Irene, Russell, Bert, Vernon and Douglas. They all lived in a cottage called "workhouse Yard", the back of which may still be seen as a wall at the end of the garden at Green Farm, opposite the Croft. Whether there was ever a workhouse near the corner of the Green seems lost in the mists of time.

In the Infants' Class, 35 children were taught in the small room at the back. The larger front room held well over 40, sitting tightly packed on long or double desks. The boys still wore pinafores over their other clothes. In 1913 the small room was enlarged. There was always a large fire in each room throughout the winter, and there was never any shortage of coal.

In the next installment, Mrs Manning recalls the mistresses, the work programme, the teaching methods, the discipline and the pattern of life in the school she knew.

*Notes from the Tostock Parish Council Meeting on Wednesday 12th December 2018

Present: Cllrs R Perks (Chairman), J Kearsley, D Blundell, P Fletcher and S Mansel Mrs S Brown (Temporary Clerk) Twelve Members of the Public

APOLOGIES: Received and accepted from: County Cllr J Storey, Cllr Cytacki and Cllr Debenham.

TO CONSIDER COMMUNITY INFRASTRUCTURE LEVY: It was hoped the Village Hall will have ideas for

funding, it was advised there was more money available than initially thought with approximately £15,000 available.

Public Forum: A resident felt the notice for the meeting on the potential development in New Road was a bit misleading. The Chair advised emails had been sent out to as many as possible, as it was a potential development and not a planning application it was felt a meeting should be called as soon as possible. A resident felt the developer had ticked all the boxes as they had consulted the village. A number of residents expressed concern at the potential development. It was suggested if further special meetings were called an email cascade could be used or a leaflet drop would be useful for notification as not all residents used the internet. The resident from 6 New Road addressed the Council advising the previous planning comments had been taken on board and they would now ask for the Councils support.

PLANNING:

Application DC/18/05144 Land north of village hall, Norton Road – Variation of Condition 15: Council discussed and agreed no comment.

Cllr Perks left the meeting Cllr Kearsley took the Chair

- To Consider potential development New Road: The Chair summarised the main comments received at the meeting on the 21st November:
- The Capacity of New Road and surrounding infrastructure
- The need for appropriate affordable housing
- Plooding issues in the village of Tostock
- 2 Problems already occurring with the Sewerage pumping station
- 2 Surface and Foul Water impact assessments needed

Council discussed commenting: The developer needs to take action on the issues outlined above as well as consider making part of the application for design and layout a full planning application and the remainder outline planning. The developer is asked to come back to the Parish Council when plans are finalised. To ensure proper site management is in place to avoid any unnecessary disruption. The Parish Council to highlight they would be willing to manage the green amenity areas. To highlight to the developer the importance of proper consultation with neighbours. The Parish Council would encourage the developer to look beyond building regulations. All in agreement for the Clerk to send the above comments to the developer. A number of residents gave their views on the potential development, the Chair advised the Parish Council will take on board the comments of the residents of Tostock and the comments received at the meeting. It was advised all the Parish Council can do at the present time is send their comments to the developer. The merits of a Parish Plan or a Neighbourhood Plan were briefly discussed and it was agreed to place this on the next agenda.

Application DC/18/05272 6 New Road – Outline planning permission erection of 1no dwelling creation of a new vehicular access: Council discussed Cllr Mansel proposed no objection with the comments the Parish Council are pleased this is a small two bedroom bungalow and meets the need for smaller properties in Tostock seconded by Cllr Kearsley all in agreement.

Cllr Perks re-joined the meeting as Chair

VILLAGE MATTERS:

a). Norton Road – Ditches and Trees: No further update had been received from landowner. It was advised surface water runoff from the new development on Norton Road runs into the ditch which hasn't been cleared. Cllr Mansel advised this was not an enforcement matter. The Clerk to inform Suffolk highways of surface water run-off from the Norton Road development running into a ditch which is overflowing and causing flooding on Norton road.

Natural England wished to carry out a pond survey between April and June 2019 to improve understanding of the condition of ponds across the area and will use the information to develop a strategy for pond creation and enhancement for the benefit of wildlife, particularly for the Great Crested Newt. Council all in agreement for this to take place.

APOLOGIES: Received and accepted from: Cllr P Fletcher and Cllr Mansel

Public Forum: It was reported a young man from the village who had witnessed someone clearing debris from the drains by the bridge to avoid the area flooding had come and helped with this work, thanks went to those concerned.

It was advised by a committee member of a local charity, which looked after a field within

Tostock, they were proposing the field could be used as a BMX track for local youngsters. The committee member had experience of putting in an application for a track and what was needed to get it up and running. It would need commitment from the Parish Council that they would be happy to support it but they hoped if it did go ahead the youngsters themselves would form a club for running it. To place on next agenda.

It was asked if the Parish Council knew who owned various ditches in the village as a ditch was full of garden waste and could cause flooding. The Clerk to email both Flooding & Highways at SCC and cc Cllr Storey into the email.

TO CONSIDER PARISH PLANS AND NEIGHBOURHOOD PLANS: Council had received the Good

Councillors Guide to Neighbourhood Planning, NALC Legal Topic Note 83 on Neighbourhood Planning and a SALC briefing on the subject. The Clerk advised CAS were unable to provide direct support to parishes for a Neighbourhood Plan but were able to provide consultation software and a housing needs survey which can form part of a Neighbourhood Plan. The Chair advised Tostock had a Parish Plan carried out in 2008 and explained the basic difference between a Parish Plan and Neighbourhood Plan which cannot prevent development but can propose where the development can take place. Council discussed including: time scale it can take a number of years to complete, possible costs and grants available, referendum has to be carried out & ensuring there is enough support. Once a N.P. is started the community is often approached by developers, the need to define the area of the N.P., need to form a N.P. committee, problems with identifying a site for development, how long does a N.P. last for, the support from MSDC, MSDC still has not got a Local Plan and Syear land supply. The Chair concluded this was not an easy decision and more information was needed it was agreed to ask parishes of a similar size to Tostock on their experience of N.P.'s To contact Drinkstone who have started a N.P. and Beyton who are currently considering a N.P. To place on next agenda.

PLANNING:

Application DC/18/05467 1 Park Cottages, Church Road – Erection of single storey rear extension: Council discussed and Cllr Kearsley proposed no objection seconded by Cllr Cytacki seconded all in agreement no objection.

Application DC/18/05568 Westwood, Leys Road – 2 new buildings following demolition of existing dwelling and garage: Council discussed and Cllr Kearsley proposed objecting with the comments:

The reduction in height of the pitched roof and length of the building was noted in the new application however for the area it is uncharacteristic and fails to reflect the form of development in the vicinity therefore the previous objections made by the Parish Council remain namely: 'The proposed development is cramped and contrived and neither preserves nor enhances the character of the Conservation Area. The development is end on whereas all the neighbouring properties are on large plots and aligned parallel to the road. If approved it would set an unfortunate precedent for the potential redevelopment of the other bungalows fronting Leys Road and The Leys. The Council is not averse to the demolition of the existing bungalow per se, but would wish to see an enhancement to the local neighbourhood.' This was seconded by Cllr Perks all in agreement to object with the above comments.

Application DC/19/00078 Gable Cottage, Flatts Lane – Erection of a single storey side/rear extension: Council discussed Cllr Kearsley proposed no objection seconded by Cllr Perks all in agreement no objection.

Applications decided by Planning Authority:

Application DC/18/03506 Land north of Village Hall, Norton Road – Discharge of conditions for application 4974/16 – Condition 13 (Energy Strategy): Approved Condition(s)

DC/18/04677 Land adj. Foresters, New Road – Outline planning (access to be considered)

Erection of 3no two-storey dwellings and 1no single-storey dwelling: Refused.

It was advised a number of volunteers had come forward to help move the SID when up and running. All in agreement for the Chair to continue using the x4 sites on the map showing the proposed position of the speed indication displays.
- f). Home Security Presentation: The Chair advised the Community Police Officer was intending to speak at the beginning of the Annual Parish Meeting on Home Security.
- g). Village To Do List: Following the recent volunteer event in December a number of residents had come forward to set up a 'Tidy Up Tostock' group. The group had recently walked around the village highlighting areas that need work. A number of dates have been proposed throughout the year to help keep the village tidy, to place dates in the Chronicle. The Chair thanked all the volunteers for carrying out this work and to let the Parish Council know how they can help. Cllr J Debenham highlighted the public are able to report any potholes/highway issues etc directly to SCC via their website. Cllr J Debenham to check whether the SCC reporting map shows areas of verge/ditches that SCC own and report back at the next meeting. The Chair advised the pond needs to be looked at separately and Cllr Kearsley confirmed there was a need for guidelines to protect the flora and fauna of this site. Removal of the cut grass at the correct time is the main problem. Cllr C Debenham to try to contact a suggested resident who may be able to carry this out.

It was hoped over a period of time these will all make an impact to help reduce the problem. Cllr J Debenham stated if any member of the public sees overweight lorries using for example bridges they should, if possible take photographs and report it to Highways on the SCC website.
