TOSTOCK PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish Council held a meeting on 17th May 2021, which was attended by 7 councillors and 6 members of the public.

Covid secure measures included all attendees signing in, use of hand sanitiser, social distancing and ventilation. Masks were worn throughout, although those speaking had the option to remove these for that period.

The post of Chair remained with Pip Fletcher, and Vice-Chair with Julian Kearsley.

Council voted on 7 motions which were passed by a majority / unanimously. These included the provision of a further dog waste bin where the footpath across the playing field joins Norton Road; a simplified response to some planning applications; gifting the outdoor gym equipment, purchased by the Parish Council, to the Village Hall; payment for hire of the Village Hall for Parish Council meetings.

Other matters discussed and taken forward to future meetings included possible charitable donations; flooding in the village; state of the hedge alongside Armstrong's wood.

The dates for council meetings for the rest of 2021 were agreed and are 5th July 2021; 23rd August 2021; 11th October 2021 and 6th December 2021.

For the remainder of 2021 the Parish Council will be meeting on a Monday to facilitate the cleaning schedule of the Village Hall.

The Annual Parish Meeting, which is an open public meeting designed for residents to fully engage with parish matters, will **provisionally** be held on 21st June 2021. This will depend on whether there is further easing of restrictions, as at the moment the limit on numbers using the Village Hall make it impossible to hold the APM until this time. This meeting will be called and chaired by the Parish Council Chairman, whose role is to facilitate the discussion and any points raised that should be addressed by the PC at a later date will be noted.

Once again, I would like to emphasise that there are various reporting tools available on both Suffolk County Council and Mid Suffolk District Council websites.

These include the highways reporting tool (www.suffolk.gov.uk/roads-and-transport) which is useful for reporting potholes, flooding, fallen trees etc.; the environmental health reporting tool (www.midsuffolk.gov.uk/environment/) for reporting anti-social behaviour or environmental issues etc; and the waste reporting tool (www.midsuffolk.gov.uk/waste-services/dog-bins-litter-and-fly-tipping/) for reporting fly-tipping and other waste issues. Anyone can report issues using these tools but if you have any trouble with this then, of course, please get in touch with a council member.

Suffolk Accident Rescue Service (SARS) is an emergency medical charity, based in Woolpit, operating across Suffolk and its border areas. Volunteer SARS clinicians provide immediate and advanced medical care to patients with serious or life threatening conditions or trauma. SARS responders have enhanced prehospital skills and are authorised to carry specialist drugs and equipment not normally found on frontline ambulances – they can undertake procedures and provide a level of patient care that would not normally be available outside the hospital environment. Since SARS started in 1972 it has helped treat thousands of patients and saved countless lives.



The clinicians give up their time and provide their skills without charge. This 'donation' of time equates to many hundreds of thousands of pounds each year, and the benefit that SARS clinicians can bring to a patient in terms of life-saving interventions, relief from pain and quicker recovery times is immeasurable. In 2020, the amazing volunteer SARS clinicians gave over 6,000 hours of advanced prehospital medical care throughout Suffolk. They were called out to over 100 locations across the county and all of this during a pandemic.

SMED27, our third rapid response vehicle joined SARS in early April, all thanks to the generosity of local business Smarter Metering Services. It is a significant addition to our fleet and responded to an emergency call within just 30 minutes of being handed over! With a third vehicle in operation, we have, for the first time in our nearly 50-year history, established a second base in Suffolk – hello Saxmundham. SMED26 is now based there and will help provide additional coverage and critical care along the East coast.

COUNTRY LIFE - D. POOLE NUMBER 39

Without any doubt at all, the highlight of Spring and the Easter season have to be the start of the lambing season when all our farmers are busy bringing into the world thousands of new born lambs. It is such a delight and joy for us all, and oh so cute to see them just after a few hours of being born, skipping and jumping around our meadows, full of all the joys of Spring.

Undoubtedly it's these little lambs that steel the limelight, deservedly so. But for me it's the little piglets I feel so sorry for.

They have to play second fiddle to them, but they are just as cute and cuddly as the lambs, that's my opinion anyway. So for this edition we will take a look at some pig breeds, seeing that we covered sheep in a previous edition number 8 of my Country Life articles way back in 2016. Just after the 2nd World War lots of households the men used to keep a pig or (a couple), at the bottom of the garden, mainly for extra food or income. Also around about the same time one of the highlights of any village fete, would be the fiercely fought competition – bowling for the pig, when competitors from neighbouring villages would come and challenge the locals for the top prize, often leading to a heated showdown. The idea being to knock down three heavy skittles with just two heavy cannon balls, each go, if the first ball knocked all three skittles down they were then replaced upright for the second ball, so the maximum score was six. Bowled from a long distance of 10-20 yards along the grass. Also in the 50's I can remember (Browns Pudding Factory) down at Rushbrooke Lane, Bury St Edmunds roughly where Dobbies Garden Centre stand today. The factory used to boil up waste food and then distribute out to pig breeders around the county. It was well known as the pig swill factory, it changed names to Milbecks Foods at some point or other.

The cottages pig kept in a stone Sty near to the house eating scraps from the kitchen, was a common site up until the 1950's. Now it is more difficult to keep pigs this way. Feeding waste to pigs is strictly controlled and meat is never allowed, and neighbours usually prohibit the keeping of the pig nearby. But if you have a good-sized garden, with a large airy stone building or room for a modern pig arc and no near neighbours, then pig keeping may be for you. Pigs can provide bacon and pork for your freezer, but also pigs can be pets and also provide companionship. They can help gardening by providing manure to compost for vegetable gardens, and they are delighted to help you turn over rough ground. Pigs, if well kept, are clean and straightforward to look after. But there is no doubt that pigs have a pungent smell, even if kept very clean. Which is a constant sharp reminder about 25 years ago when we both moved to Tostock there was a pronounced nasty smell which hung in the air over the entire village especially when the wind was in the wrong direction, likewise known by the locals as the 'Woolpit Whiff. So you need to be prepared for this. Choice of breed is important as commercial pigs get absolutely huge so the garden pig needs to be from a relatively small breed such the Berkshire or the traditional cottages pig, the Gloucester Old Spot.

Another possibility is the Oxford Sandy and Black. The Berkshire is a black pig and is made more attractive by having white feet and a white tip to its tail. It is hardy and thrifty. The Gloucester Old Spot has a fatter carcase than the Berkshire and does well in cold conditions.

The Oxford Sandy and Black is a docile pig that thrives on rooting. Piglets are very appealing but they need very good fencing as they root under fencing as well as pushing against it. They can clear land for future vegetable growing for you. Pigs are naturally clean if given plenty of straw and not overcrowded. Whatever pig you choose you will need to sort out identification and movement and register with DEFRA before the pig or piglets arrive. Pigs of any age moving from holdings to a market of any kind must be permanently identified with the DEFRA herd mark of your holdings. Also if you move them off your holdings to slaughter they are still required to be permanently identified with the DEFRA herd mark. What goes into the trough. Pigs have a reputation for living on waste products but to achieve health and meet modern requirements, they need to have a balanced diet. Pigs love to eat, love to root in their straw beds, in their pens and if at pasture in the grass and mud.

Feeding time should also be fun for pigs and should be fed at least twice a day and to be able to look for food for at least part of the rest of the day. A foraging pig will find grass, grubs including earthworms, roots and fallen fruit to supplement its diet in a healthy way. So a confined pig also needs to be busy perhaps searching out waste vegetables and roots as well as the balanced ration that you will need to provide. Bagged pig food is readily available and is designed for the purpose so you can buy feeds that range from piglet creep feed to pet pig feeds. Meals must not be fed dry, pigs like wet feed and you can add surplus goats milk to feed in a trough. Pigs troughs are usual way to feed and this way you can dampen the food and the trough needs to kept clean.

Now for some rare pig breeds - Gloucestershire Old Spot also known as Gloucester Old Spot, is an English breed of pig which is predominantly white with black spots, its named after the county, known for its docility, intelligence and prolificity. The boars reach a mature weight of 600 lbs (272 kg) and sows 500 lbs (227 kg). The pigs are white with clearly defined black not blue spots. There must be a least one spot on the body to be accepted to be on this registry. The breeds maternal skills enable it to raise large litters of piglets on pasture.

The Gloucestershire Ols Spots (GOS) breed society was formed in 1913, the originators of that society called the breed Old Spots because the pig had been known for as long as anyone could remember. The first pedigree records of pigs began in 1885, Much later than it did for cattle, sheep, and horses because the pig was a peasant's animal, a scavenger and it was never highly regarded. No other Spotted breed was recorded before 1913, so todays GOS is recognised as the oldest such breed in the world from the British Pig Association, although there have been spotted pigs around for two or three, centuries, GOS has only had pedigree status since the early 20th century.

British Saddleback

The British Saddlebacks are hardy and noted for their mothering ability. The breed is known for its grazing ability, it has secured a niche in outdoor and organic production. These are docile pigs making them more manageable more than some. They are liked by many as they are attractive pigs and because they are bigger than some of the breeds. They produce good bacon. The fine and sturdy Saddleback is an amalgamation of the Wessex and Essex Saddlebacks and is hardy, lope eared and impressively deep bodied. They are naturally good mothers and have an easy non-aggressive temperament, in no rush to do anything and take everything in their stride

Large Black

British Landrace breed large white

The Tamworth's red/gold hair makes it as one of the most recognisable of the traditional pig breeds. It is thought to be most typical breed descended from the old indigenous species, old English forest pig. The sows are excellent mothers, being milky, docile as well as protective. The Tamworth is hardy and can be kept in environments ranging from rough pasture to meadowlands.

The founding of the Large Black Society in 1889 led to an increase in the exchange of stock between the breeders in the three localities – East Anglia, Devon and Cornwall. In the early part of the 20th century Large Blacks became more widely distributed, and were frequently crossed with the Large Whites and Middle Whites to produce both porkers and baconers. The breed was also very successful in the show rings. It is the rarest native breed pig in the U.K. Unlike most pigs the Large Black does not suffer from sunburn. It has been exported all over the world. Although the hair is black the skin of the pig is white.

Large Black sows make wonderful mothers. Most pigs rootle, the Large Black is a natural grazer. In the 1870's Mrs Beaton recommended the Black pig above all others. It's the U.K.'s only all black pig. The British Landrace is a British domestic breed of pig and one of the most popular in the United Kingdom. It is white with heavy drooping ears which covers most of the face and is bred for pork and bacon. Large Whites and Medium Whites originated in the 1949 importation of 12 Landrace pigs from Scandinavia – 4 boars and 8 gilts (immature females). It is a very versatile breed preforming well under indoor or outdoor systems of management. Sows have the ability to produce and rear large litters of piglets with very good daily gain and high lean meat content in a superably fleshed carcase, which is ideal for either pork or bacon production. Should you wish to keep pigs it is most important to ensure that you have vermin proof storage for the bagged feeds. Not only is it costly to lose good food to the vermin such as rats and mice but also they can transmit disease to you and your pigs and will need to be controlled.

Don't encourage them in the first place by giving them free meals. Also excess food (uneaten waste food) will certainly attract them. Adjust your rations accordingly, pigs tend to eat less in hot weather, and if the pig is not taking the food it should, then consult your veterinarian. If your pigs have access to good grass, they can consume up to 10lbs or so a day but the grass will need to be readily accessible. 7lbs of good grass could replace about a 1lb of pig feed. Whatever the end objective for your pigs, keeping them on a small scale means you can get to know them and make their lives more pleasurable. Remember, they are big, strong animals with a nasty bite when roused so treat them with respect as, like all large animals can be dangerous. Keep a strong fence between pigs and children or domestic pets to be on the safe side and learn pig handling skills before becoming a pig keeper.

Finally, why not have some fun and get rid of the dog and get yourself a new pet and companion instead. On the pet side of things the Vietnamese pot-bellied pigs who with their appealing wrinkled faces and intelligence can become very much part of your family. They are the ultimate pet pig and very affectionate. They have the same basic needs as all pigs and the same rules and regulations – so go on and treat yourselves.
