



The Future

Unfortunately the Society is facing a difficult financial situation. Our financial forecast shows a deficit by the end of 2024 of over £200. Put simply the membership will need to make some difficult decisions at the November AGM.

Already in 2023 we have increased our membership fee by 50% and to survive we would need to increase our membership by one third. At the present time the committee does not feel this is viable. If we look at the other members of the Suffolk History Society it seems that quite a few societies are struggling with some showing no programme going forward.

Maybe after 36 years we have to accept that the Society in its current format is no longer viable.





Part 2

Tostock Church School



During the 1940's additional accommodation had to be found, especially when Mrs Marsh arrived with school children from London. The house on the corner of The Leys and The Green, known as Green End, was originally a Reading Room or Day Room for the village. This was taken over as a classroom. The school was also used for social events especially on Friday evenings. Whist drives and dances were held to raise money for a Welcome Home Fund for returning servicemen.

It remained a school until 1945 and due to the problem in finding teachers the authorities decided to close it. The children then had to go to school at Elmswell by bus.

It was at this point the residents of Tostock started to raise money to buy the school and use it as a village hall. A receipt is held within the archives which identifies the purchase of the Tostock Village School from the Ministry of Education for the sum £700 in 1955.

The third part of the story will cover the school as the Village Hall and then its transformation into a private home.

New to the village or wanting to get fully up to speed on the Village Hall Improvement Project?

We want to make sure that everyone is able to continue to have their say and be involved with the Village Hall Improvement Project.

As many of you may recall, in 2021 we carried out an extensive **village wide survey** to understand your views on the improvements needed to enhance the Village Hall. If you are new to the village and would like to complete this questionnaire, please email us on <u>tostockvillagehall@outlook.com</u> and we can send you a copy of the questionnaire to complete. This information continues to remain vital to the future decisions that will need to be made on how we shape improvements to the hall.

Additionally, in 2022 we held a **village information session** in the hall where everyone was invited to see displays of the initial ideas and plans for the future improvement of the hall, as well as meet with the Architect and the Village Hall Committee's team who have been involved in the project. If you were not able to attend this session, you can see all of the information which was presented via <u>www.affectcommunity.org</u> This includes your chance to outline views on which of the design concepts you prefer.

What is the latest update? The primary focus of the current phase of the improvement project is centred around identifying and applying for potential sources of funding. This is a long and uncertain process and it will probably not be until early next year before we are clearer on the money that may be available to fund the project.

In order to progress several of the grant applications we need to have planning permission in place so we will be making a planning application in the next few months. We will publish details of this application once it is finalised but clearly our ability to complete the work is entirely dependent on the amount of funding that we can secure. We will continue to keep you posted.


It's a dog's life





A Mr Bob Copping has sent down some material with the intentions of it being published in one of my Countrylife editions, hoping it will get through to me, in which case it certainly has. My thanks very much to Doreen Buckle who has passed it on. If some of you are old enough you may remember Bob who lived in Tostock in his early years, 1933 – 1949. Interest wise, Bob and myself are very much alike (two of a kind), we are both into birding and wildlife, both very conscientious. Although he is a little older than me, on all accounts, he seems to be a little bit of a "rumon" as they say in Suffolk or a rascal, and a scallywag. His favourite hunting ground being the Tostock Low Meadows, whereas mine was the Sicklesmere Low Meadows I spent as a youngster. The Tostock Low Meadows Bob refers to was called Grove Farm and is nowadays The Blackbourn Nature Reserve owned by Suffolk Wildlife Trust.

Here is Bob's plan of the area he calls Low Meadows and some pictures.

Bob, my school days 1939-1948 moved to Stowmarket 1949. Started work and 2 years National Service. During the spring/summer months I used to spend a lot of time bird nesting, covering local haunts of the naturalist The Rev. Julian Tuck. He died the year I was born 1933. He had a large collection of birds eggs (six cabinets) and also many stuffed birds, all of which are now housed in the Ipswich Museum. My favourite was an extensive marsh we call Tostock Low Meadows. It was, in fact, in Norton, the railway line being the borderline. This marsh was easily reached from our house using the footpaths. There were very few gateways leading to individual fields on this marsh. Small dykes, which led from the main river, were often the only way from field to field, and sometimes a fallen tree would act as a bridge. Invariably I would be alone, losing all track of time not having the luxury of a watch. Mother often said (don't be late for dinner 12.30). When I did eventually get home, most times it would be slightly dried having been kept warm in the oven next to the fire. I always enjoyed my food, as they were hungry times. During the winter months, with the river so congested with vegetation, these marshes often flooded. When the harsh frosts came they froze over and the village children would go sliding on the many acres of ice, not having to worry of falling in as it was always about 1ft thick.



The bird nesting, the sliding over the ice and lovely smell of the smoke from the steam trains drifting over these marshes will always be unforgettable.

Early days breeding birds down the Low Meadows were Snipe, Lapwings, plus a good selection of other birds. Made regular visits again late 1960's to mid 1970's, nesting newcomers, Red Shank, Teal, Coot and Little Grebe but no Snipe. April/May 1970 heard call of Little Grebe, found nest in a dyke a distance from the river, bred successfully. Winter 1970 estimated count 300 Teal on shallow flooded marsh. 1971 the following breeding season found nest of Teal with 9 eggs (one of the most difficult nests to find). Return visit found nest/eggs destroyed by light grazing cattle. 1971 a pair of Red Shanks present all season, mating observed, no nest found, probably come to the same fate as the Teal. April/May 1971 two pairs of Canada Geese attempted to breed for the first time. one nest at the Norton end on the riverbank, second nest Tostock end amongst dead branches of a fallen tree. Both sets of incubated eggs were taken by mindless persons, birds not seen again. Most years early spring, shallow flooding. Mallard ducks nested in Pollarded tree hollows, one nest contained 22 eggs, the result of two females to one male. Only Tawny Owls were found in similar trees. 1971 one solitary white front goose. A Kingfisher nested in large roots of a fallen tree, very unusual place. Reed Buntings very

common. No Nightingales heard throughout. River dredged in the mid 70's. Dykes dried up and birds decreased. Later fishing lakes were made and a tree planting project started. Here are some of my photographs of birds that Bob saw in the early 60' s and 70's.

I've already mentioned that Bob was a little bit of a "rumon" and he wrote a book called The Tostock Scalliwag" (2008) Here are two of his tales he sent me from the book. Goose eggs. The boy I stopped from getting a further hiding for some reason pelting me with stones. He was on the School corner and I was in New Road and he was near his house in Church Road. Not being as good at stone throwing as myself, I avoided getting hit. I told him to stop, which didn't seem to register at all, telling him that if I threw a stone at him I would hit him. I was so provoked I threw my first stone, which hit him in the face breaking the left lens of his glasses. With that he hurried indoors. I thought (I'm in for a lot of bother) and I must admit I was worried of the outcome. Nothing materialised that day. The next day during school dinner break, playing in the playground, along came the boy's mother. A short little woman approached the paled wooden fence and beckoned to me, I went to her a bit sheepish like. She said "Bobby, I want to whisper something" so, head on one side, I leaned towards her and at that moment she hit me on the side of my head with a rotten goose egg saying (that's for breaking my boy's glasses). I had to go home and get cleaned up, as the smell and mess were dreadful. I thought I got off lightly considering. As I have stated before, I mostly hit my target when I threw stones. I don't suppose he told his mother that he started the stone throwing.

Bob's second varn – Raining Frogs. One day I went to a farm at Norton where they were carting corn from the field, I was only there for the rides, I think. Anyhow, we had just arrived back in the field with an empty wagon a large black storm cloud came along. It started to pelt down so we all made shelter in the farm. The storm soon passed over and we made our way back to the wagon. All around the wagon and the wagon floor which was at least 4 or 5 feet from the ground, were thousands of tiny frogs, country folk call them "freshers". I asked the old farm workers where the frogs had come from and they said they came with the storm, and to them didn't seem unusual. When I left school I wanted to be a farm worker but father had better things in mind so a carpenter and joiner I became. Well done Bob I hope you will be satisfied, and many thanks for the material you sent down to me. You will be pleased to know right up to this present day hardly a day go by when I don't go down to the Blackbourn Nature Reserve so I thought I would conclude with some of my photographs showing the present day hot spots of birds and mammals that I can almost guarantee I will see down there throughout the year starting in January right through until December whenever I go there.
