Parish Council Meeting

9th January 2024

Brief summary of the Parish Council meeting 9th January 2024

Members of the Council and the Public stood for a minutes silence to remember Cllr Vanessa Malcom.

Speeding and Highway issues were again a hot topic. The 20mph speed limit is due to be introduced in Tostock (*now introduced. Ed*) to make the 'rat run' unattractive.

Report from the Budget Working Party reflected the poor financial state that the Parish Council had been left in and the measures that needed to be taken to rectify it. The report is on the village website and also the Parish Notice Board.

Minutes of the meeting are on the village website.

Next Parish Council meeting is on Tuesday 12th March at 7.30pm in the Village Hall.



VACANCY OF TOSTOCK VILLAGE RECORDER

For the past 5 years I have taken on the role of Tostock Village Recorder, but have now resigned from this post due to moving later this year.

We now need a volunteer to take over my role as the Village Recorder.

Why is a Village Recorder required?

To record today's activities and be on the lookout for items of historical interest that might otherwise be overlooked or lost. These records will be of great use for future historians and of local interest.

What does the Village Recorder do?

How much a Recorder does is down to each individual and how much time they have at their disposal. The minimum requirement is to produce an annual report which summarises some of the events and changes that have taken place during the past calendar year. This is normally submitted in January/February to the Suffolk Local History Council who send it into the Suffolk Archives.

My own experience of being the village recorder has been producing an Annual Report taking photographs during the year of village events/activities as well as physical changes to the village. In addition, I have close contact with the Tostock Past and Present Society, the Tostock Chronicle, and help maintain the Tostock Archives which are held in the Village Hall. But how much one does is entirely up to you and the amount of time you have spare.

There is good support from the Suffolk Local History Council who are always available to give advice. In addition, there is a yearly Recorders Conference held in Elmswell where one can meet fellow recorders.

I have enjoyed this post and it has given me an insight to the village and it's history as well as introducing me to many of you. Whilst I am still in the village, I will continue helping in the Village Archives and will help to support the new Recorder if they so wish.



The planning application for the proposed improvements to the village hall went live in early January 2024, following an unforeseen and frustrating six-week delay. 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
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

The two photographs on the left are of the Osprey taking out a fish from the loch at 4.50 am in the morning. As I left the loch it occurred to me that this could be undoubtedly the mornings conversation with Sir John. Sure enough a few hours later it was (I tried to pass the credit onto Sir John, thanking him for the

opportunity) but he was not going to have any of it, that's how modest and passionate he is. The photo on the right is of Sir John's private lodge down at the loch where he does most of his writing. I should imagine this is where he sat and wrote his book "On The Waters Edge" The second hide



called the Campbell hide named after photographer Laurie Campbell, the hide is designed with careful consideration for those wishing to photograph pine martens and red squirrels. Hide three is a tree top hide an elevated viewing platform overlooking the moorland above the loch, it is an ideal place for early risers to sit and watch passing red and roe deer, ravens and even a rapture or two, buzzards and red kites. Hide four the quarry hide is located in an ideal wooded spot, close by some well established badger sets. With visits to this hide accompanied by an Aigas ranger, guests regularly spot pine martens, badgers, tawny and barn owls as well as roe deer, on odd occasions the Golden Eagle. Here are some of my photos taken from the various hides.







I have read two of Sir John's books. Once you pick up one of his books, I can reassure you, you won't want to put it down in a hurry so this is where I'm testing you all to see if you are of the same opinion, so now is an excerpt of a couple of pages from his book "Gods of the Morning" Spike the Pine Marten. I turn up the old avenue of limes and horse chestnuts picking my way through the prickly shells of fallen conkers on the path. I crossed the burn on the little bridge where the water from the high moor, brandy-wine brown, gossips a private conspiracy between mossy stones, hurrying down to join the river. It is difficult to pass over and I stand on the bridge for a moment or two, smiling inwardly. Just then I get that overpowering sense that I am not alone. Like a line from a cheap thriller, I feel someone's eyes drilling into the back of my head. I turn slowly. At first I can't see anything and think I must be mistaken, but then, as pure and shocking as finding a stranger in your kitchen, our eyes meet. At my eye level and only 10ft away, a pine marten, the size of a small cat, is perched upright in the central fork of a rowan tree beside the burn. His black front paws rest on a diagonal stem and his long elegant tails floats below. He is staring straight at me. Cont.

I am rooted. How long has he been watching me? Why hasn't he run away? Why has he let me get so close? What is going on inside that tight little torpedo of a skull? He is magnificent. His head is angular and pert, a sharp little face reflecting a sharper intelligence within. The ears are small and rounded. His wet nose gleams in the morning light. The velvet suiting of dark chocolate, a V-shaped bib runs down his chest and between his forelegs, as orange as the filling of a cream egg. A single coco spike-shaped smudge at the bottom of his bib gives him away. He is Spike, a full grown dog marten who visits the hides and has been around for a couple of years. Unblinking, his eyes are as bright and beady as polished jet. He doesn't move. A pine marten's life is simple, driven by need and fear. Need for food and a mate, fear of man the dreaded predator, the exterminator. Occasionally a Golden Eagle swooping from above will catch a marten out in the open, but man is by far the greatest threat. Trapped for their glowing fur, shot for stealing hens, poisoned for taking game, not so long ago we drove them to the very edge of doom. So here we are. The man and the marten. The seconds ticking by. My eves are locked onto his, his onto mine. My brain has emptied down, nothing to offer. For as long as it will last, time has stopped. He is glaring at me like an angry drunk at the other end of the bar, daring me to look away.

Very slowly I withdraw my wits from his demonic, levelled gaze. I know why he is there. It is a rowan tree. It is his time for gorging on rowan berries and he does not like to be disturbed. He has been to the top of the tree and bitten off several weighty bunches of fruit. They lie scattered on the ground between us. He was on his way down to get the berries, caught in the middle. His dilemma is twofold: to come down for the spoils, or let discretion win, and leap away through the trees as fleet as a squirrel. If he ventures down to the fallen berries he must come closer to me. If he flees he could be gone in a flash of chocolate fur. He wants his berries. Indecision and indignation have clashed in his marten brain. Stale mate. Not in a million years would I have predicted what happened next. I had only foreseen one option: his nerve would eventually fail and he would turn and vanish. After all these years of seeing and thinking I knew pine martens, I would have put good money on it. Oh! We are so smug. Its all good interesting stuff, this is wildlife, but we humans are the superior beings, the smart-arses who boast about wildness as though it is a commodity, something we have invented for our own pleasure and can dabble with as we please. We think we know the pine marten. The smugness of our own imprinting was wrapping me round like a fog. I fooled myself into thinking my superior brain was back in control. It was just a matter of waiting – yes, a game of who will blink first, and I was in charge. But that wasn't how Spike saw things this morning. It was as though he had sussed that I wasn't going to give in – had weighed it all up and carefully considered his options. Without slightest hint of panic or hurry he turned away and disappeared down the far side of the trunk of the rowan. Ha I thought, I won. I was wrong. Oh god ! I was wrong, wrong, wrong. He appeared again at the foot of the tree and in three guick bounds he came straight towards me. From only five feet away a chittering yell of abuse broke from his throat. hurled at me with all the venom he could muster. Then he snatched up a bunch of berries – his berries – threw me a disdainful glance and vanished back into the undergrowth. The end.

That was just a couple of pages. You can just imagine what the whole book would read like, I hope you will all agree – you literally get hooked and can't put the book down. Thank you Sir John this is country life at its very best.
